#### **Public Comments**

Barb Church, 102 East Wheeler Avenue, appeared before the Council and indicated the Friends of North Mankato Group had been contacted regarding a substantial donation towards the purchase of the Tschohl property located at 1610 LorRay Drive. Church stated she has concerns with the proposed commercial parking, located at 231 and 233 Wheeler Avenue, in an area now zoned residential.

<u>Brian Mechler, 303 Belgrade Avenue,</u> appeared before the Council and requested assistance in retrieving his property left in his vehicle after Affordable Towing towed his vehicles.

John Hurd, 732 Garfield Avenue, appeared before the Council and indicated the Trust for Public Land was interested in working with the Friends of North Mankato Group regarding the Tschohl property.

#### **Business Items**

North Mankato Police Department 2014 Year End Report. Chief Boyer appeared before the Council and provided the 2014 Year End Report. Boyer stated the total number of reported incidents increased by 23 calls. Boyer indicated that the North Mankato Police were working in the schools as a way to add security and improve relations with the youth. He noted the Police Reserve were instrumental in helping throughout the year with parades, festivals and events. Boyer reported a new Patrol Officer would be joining the force soon. Administrator Harrenstein noted North Mankato was a safe City and he was pleased that the Police Chief's main statement to the Council was to keep your car locked. Harrenstein stated it was because of the hard work of the men and women who serve in the Police Department that North Mankato is safe. Council Member Norland thanked Chief Boyer for his involvement in the Tapestry Program.

Announcement of Book Title for 2015 Community Read. Library Director Lucy Lowry appeared before the Council and announced the 2015 Community Read as Wladyslaw Szpilman's memoir The Pianist. Lowry noted the book could be picked up at the North Mankato Taylor Library, Dino's Pizzeria, Mark's Barber Shop, South Central College Library, Frandsen Bank & Trust, Lor Ray Drive Salon & Spa, Y Barbers and the Garden of Eat'n. She also indicated several events would be occurring throughout the months of April and May.

Res. No. 26-15 Authorizing the Sale of Real Estate at 706 and 710 Range Street. City Planner Fischer stated the properties located at 706 and 710 Range Street were acquired using HUD funds and as part of the resale of the property it is required that the property is sold to a low income family. Fischer reported the properties at both 706 and 710 Range Street will be sold to Habitat for Humanity for \$15,000 per property. Council Member Steiner moved, seconded by Council Member Norland, to approve the Resolution Authorizing the Sale of Real Estate at 706 and 710 Range Street. Vote on the motion: Norland, Freyberg, Spears, Steiner and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

Consider Approving Request for Proposal for the Sale and Relocation of Properties Located at 231 and 233 Wheeler Avenue. City Planner Fischer indicated the City acquired both properties with the intent to use the space for parking. There are three Requests for Proposals for the sale and relocation of properties, one for the garage located at 233 Wheeler Avenue, one for the house at 233 Wheeler Avenue and one for the garage and house located at 231 Wheeler Avenue. Council Member Norland moved, seconded by Council member Steiner to approve the Request for Proposal for the Sale and Relocation of Properties Located at 231 and 233 Wheeler Avenue. Vote on the motion: Norland, Freyberg, Spears, Steiner and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

#### City Administrator and Staff Comments

Administrator Harrenstein stated in order to assist the public and in response to a member of the governing body he was providing a memo outlining the reverse referendum process.

Administrator Harrenstein indicated that because there is no request for rezoning the property located at 1610 LorRay Drive (Tschohl Property) it was a good time to work with the citizens who are interested in creating a park out of the Tschohl property and suggested convening two or three

meetings. Council Member Spears moved, seconded by Council Member Freyberg to Organize Meetings with the Public Concerning the Tschohl Property. Vote on the motion: Norland, Freyberg, Spears, Steiner and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

Administrator Harrenstein reported that City Intern Matt Lassonde had accepted a position at Bolton & Menk and thanked him for his hard work.

Public Works Director Swanson reported that with the new waste collection contract Riverbend Recycling had experienced an increase of product and he would report the numbers to the Council next month. Swanson indicated Riverbend Recycling does recycle TVs but residents must pay by the pound.

Public Works Director Swanson stated the compost site was open.

#### **Mayor and Council Comments**

Council Member Spears directed staff to see if they could assist Brian Mechler in getting his property returned.

Mayor Dehen noted Mankato and North Mankato has one of the lowest unemployment rates in Minnesota and the region would be adding 1,000 jobs to the community. Dehen stated the community needs to pursue quality of life so people will choose to live in North Mankato.

#### **Public Comments**

Brian Mechler, 303 Belgrade Avenue, appeared before Council and expressed his concerns about the North Mankato Police Department.

There being no further business, on a motion by Council Member Norland, seconded by Council Member Freyberg, the meeting adjourned to closed session to discuss the Administrator's review at 7:50 p.m.



#### **Executive Summary**

#### ES-05 Executive Summary - 24 CFR 91.200(c), 91.220(b)

#### 1. Introduction

The Consolidated Plan for the City of North Mankato has been completed in consistency to the requirements set forth by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) in regard to the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program.

The Consolidated Plan is a five-year planning document covering the years of 2015 through 2019. The plan identifies areas of need in regard to housing and community development and lays out how the City of North Mankato plans to utilize the CDBG entitlement funds to address these issues as set forth by HUD guidelines.

The Consolidated Plan consists of three assessment sections, a housing and homeless needs assessment, a housing market analysis, and a community needs assessment identifying the housing and community needs including that of the homeless and special populations. The plan also includes a Strategic Plan which outlines the strategies and goals of the community to acknowledge and resolve the issues identified in the assessment sections. An Annual Action Plan is also included in the document which is one of five annual plans that outline how the federal CDBG entitlement funds will be allocated in FY 2015.

## 2. Summary of the objectives and outcomes identified in the Plan Needs Assessment Overview

Based on demonstrated need, funds and time commitment, the City may choose to use CDBG funds for the above mentioned uses. They City may continue to use CDBG funds in a manner which has proven to be successful over the past five years.

#### 3. **Evaluation of past performance**

North Mankato became an entitlement community in 2009 and has completed its first 5 year consolidated plan. During the period of 2010-2014, the City used CDBG funds to:

- Assist first-time homebuyers with down payment assistance
- Provide single-family housing rehabilitation loans
- Fund a portion of a new comprehensive plan
- Replace entrance doors at Municipal Building to become ADA compliant
- Acquire and demolish single-family dwellings for reuse

In the 2010-2014 Consolidated Plan, the City identified several potential uses for CDBG funds. However, due to the limited CDBG funds the City receives annually, the regulations related to the use of funds and staff time commitments, the City focused on a narrow range of projects. In preparation of its second five-year consolidated plan, the City has learned more about the CDBG program in terms of eligible projects, federal regulations and staff time needed to administer the program. Therefore, the 2015-2109 will focus on projects the City has the capacity to administer.

#### 4. Summary of citizen participation process and consultation process

The City of North Mankato and City of Mankato participated in a joint citizen participation which created the opportunity for local agencies interested in providing input into the consolidated plan process to attend. Three meetings were held targeting economic development and local government, homeless and housing providers, and social service providers. Lisa Graphenteen with the Southwest Minnesota Housing Partnership facilitated the three meetings. The citizen participation meetings provided the opportunity for each community to hear from a variety of local organizations who represent a diverse clientele. It provided the opportunity to better understand the challenges that face certain populations.

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#### 5. Summary of public comments

Written comments were received from nine individuals for those unable to attend the meetings or from individuals that wanted to submit their comments in writing and are aattached. The key needs identified in these comments include:

- Increase bicycle infrastructure and connectivity to make downtown and services more usable.
- Being cognizant of increased gentrification and its impact on housing.
- Need for additional affordable workforce housing.
- Transitional housing for those exiting jail or treatment to reintegrate with families and the community.
- Rental rehabilitation to maintain and improve rental conditions.
- Need for a housing model to serve chronic alcohol/drug abusers, sometimes referred to as a "wethouse".
- Limited transportation options on evenings and weekends and to smaller communitites surrounding Mankato and North Mankato.
- Funding to the Open Door Clinic has been a critical component to providing health care assistance for uninsured households.

#### 6. Summary of comments or views not accepted and the reasons for not accepting them

All comments received were accepted and are included as an attachment in the Citizen Participation section.

#### 7. Summary

During the first five years of being an entitlement community, the City has gained useful knowledge of the CDBG program in terms the appropriate uses of funds based on the annual allocation and time commitments. The City will continue to allocate CDBG funds to projects which have proven to be successful and consider others identified through the public participation process.

#### 1. Introduction

The City of Mankato and City of North Mankato participated in a joint citizen participation process due to the proximity of the communities. This provided the opportunity for local agencies interested in providing input into the consolidated plan process to attend one meeting verses separate meetings for each community. Three meetings were held targeting economic development and local government, homeless and housing providers, and social service providers. The public and local agencies were welcome to attend any of the meetings. Flyers were distributed to 58 local groups including nonprofit agencies, public entities, and for profit groups. Also every Chair from Envision 2020 was provided a flyer to distribute to stakeholders. Envision 2020 is a long-range community plan that began in 2006 and involved over 400 community stakeholders. Participants continue to track progress on 34 goals in 6 Key Performance Areas: Education, Economic Development, Transportation, Health & Human Services, Livability, and Community Planning/Regional Governance.

Participation in the three meetings was strong with a total of 31 unduplicated participants, as some individuals opted to attend multiple meetings. Written comments were received from an additional 8 individuals. Following the meetings, the facilitator summarized the meeting notes and provided these and the written comments to each community to review and incorporate as part of their plan. The citizen participation meetings provided the opportunity for each community to hear from a variety of local organizations who represent a diverse clientele. It provided the opportunity to better understand the challenges that face certain populations. Each community will give consideration to the comments and feedback received in the development of the Consolidated Plan.

The Community Development Department of the City of North Mankato has a strong working relationship with other supportive housing providers in the area. The Family Homeless Prevention and Assistance Program (FHPAP) is administered by Blue Earth County Human Services and Minnesota Valley Action Council (MVAC) and serves a nine county area including Nicollet County/North Mankato. Through the Housing Choice Voucher Program (HCV), staff communicates regularly with area property owners, social service providers, and assisted living facilities. The City owned Koppen Gardens is a 74 unit public housing unit accepting section 8 vouchers through the SCMMCHRA.

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Describe coordination with the Continuum of Care and efforts to address the needs of homeless persons (particularly chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans, and unaccompanied youth) and persons at risk of homelessness

North Mankato is a part of the Southeast Minnesota Regional Continuum of Care. The City of North Mankato understands the importance of helping extremely low- and low-income families who are at imminent risk of becoming homeless. The City will continue to analyze updated data, work with local organizations, and explore ways to help these families, households, and individuals. Currently there are several programs to address the needs of the long-term homeless that have been endorsed by the CoC:

- Eight Shelter + Care Vouchers
- Four units of long term homeless supportive housing at Breckenridge Townhomes
- Nine Bridges vouchers, a state funded program to house the mentally ill

## Describe the number and type of single person households in need of housing assistance.

According to SCMMCHRA there are currently 77 one bedroom applicants on the waiting list. Single person households are often mentally or physically disabled. They could also be homeless youth- age 18+. There are also immigrant single person households. They may need access to public transportation and social and mental health services.

Estimate the number and type of families in need of housing assistance who are disabled or victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking.

Approximately 5% of families currently receiving assistance are disabled. The HRA does not track VAWA but have experienced approximately 10 situations in North Mankato per year for the past few years.

## What are the most common housing problems?

Affordability and availability and accessibility. There is a saturation of low income/higher poverty in the housing units on Lee Blvd.

## Are any populations/household types more affected than others by these problems?

Single person households and larger families that need 3 or more bedrooms have a more difficult time finding units.

Describe the characteristics and needs of Low-income individuals and families with children (especially extremely low-income) who are currently housed but are at imminent risk of either residing in shelters or becoming unsheltered 91.205(c)/91.305(c)). Also discuss the needs of formerly homeless families and individuals who are receiving rapid re-housing assistance and are nearing the termination of that assistance

Any family on the Housing Choice Voucher waiting list is most likely rent burdened. The HRA regularly has applicants that are without housing due to evictions or foreclosure. There is also a fair amount of temporary "couch-hopping" until they can receive assistance and find a unit. The HRA is not involved with Rapid Re-Housing programs.

## Specify particular housing characteristics that have been linked with instability and an increased risk of homelessness

Units that are not affordable- above HUD payment standards and landlords are not willing to lower rent to work with HCV program. Units that are aging or in disrepair and landlords are unwilling to make repairs. Units in higher crime area or heavier concentration of poverty. Overcrowded units- if a family of 4 living in a 2 bedroom apartment adds another child to the household they are no longer eligible to live in the unit and must move to a larger unit. Most often there are no larger units available.

### Discussion

The projected housing needs and market analysis support North Mankato's housing priorities that will be addressed in the next five years. Housing activities include single-family housing rehabilitation, rental property rehabilitation, home ownership assistance, redevelopment of blighted areas, neighborhood revitalization, and downtown redevelopment.

### Introduction

North Mankato has growing populations of racial and ethnic minorities over the past decade. The proportion of racial and ethnic minorities, however, has remained low and steady in recent years, as the overall population of the community has grown at a similar or more rapid rate. Most recent data from the American Community Survey indicates an overall population of 13,387 in North Mankato. About 6% of North Mankato residents represent racial and ethnic minority groups, including Hispanic/Latino ethnicity. The groups are well distributed across Census tracts, not concentrated in certain neighborhoods.

MVAC Homeless Prevention Data - Since 7/1/13, MVAC has screened 2085 households for FHPAP services. All persons screened were triaged for urgency of situation and appropriateness of services, provided information on resources, provided with referrals and assisted with problem solving. 481 (23%) of these households were enrolled into FHPAP and another 77 (4%) were assisted with a HUD funded program. Of the 1527 households that MVAC was unable to assist, 188 (12%) were because of a lack of funding and 380 (25%) were living in housing that was unaffordable for them. Other reasons for not being served by FHPAP include: crisis resolvable through other means, no qualifying crisis, over-income and lack of follow through. Proportionally, these non-enrolled households are 52% family, 42% adults and 5% youth.

## Describe the characteristics of special needs populations in your community:

Persons with special needs are generally connected with agencies in the area to work with and address special needs. The number of people with special housing needs is expected to increase as the population continues to age. Monarch Meadows and Oak Terrace Senior Housing Community offer assisted living units for those with Alzheimer's or dementia to help meet some of the special housing needs.

## What are the housing and supportive service needs of these populations and how are these needs determined?

Nicollet County Human Services addresses supportive housing for special needs populations along with those agencies listed above. The needs are determined by the agencies who serve these populations.

According to the Minnesota Department of Health, there were 11 people (33.6 rate) living with HIV/AIDS in Nicollet County in 2013.

The Rural AIDS Action Network (RAAN) is the only organization that serves the HIV/AIDS population in rural Minnesota. The RAAN's mission is to organize, develop, and sustain caring communities of professionals and volunteers that serve and support persons living with, affected by, or at risk for HIV/AIDS in rural Minnesota.

The RAAN has an office in North Mankato and offers the following services: medical case management, free and confidential HIV testing, medical transportation assistance, health education/risk reduction, support groups, and professional training. This office services the entire Southern Minnesota area from South Dakota to Wisconsin. They work closely with area hospitals and clinics and have an infectious disease doctor at the ISJ clinic.

The availability of housing for those with HIV/AIDS in the City of North Mankato is not a seemingly imminent problem, or one that is predicted to be in the future. With such a low HIV/AIDS population, this is to be expected. This does not mean however the City will not continue to investigate and monitor the situation and explore ways that it can help these individuals when or if it is needed.

## **Housing Market Analysis**

### MA-05 Overview

## Housing Market Analysis Overview:

The City has a high quality of housing stock and variety of options that allow residents to find housing at all stages of life. Existing homes have been well maintained as the unique character of each neighborhood is preserved. Housing in North Mankato continues to be a strength in attracting young families to the area.

The City of North Mankato has a rental housing registration program. In September 2013 there were 1,580 registered rental units in the City. Specialized senior housing projects may not be required to register if they are otherwise licensed by the State. However, at least one senior project, with 44 units, is registered with the City.

The breakdown of rental units by type that were contracted by the survey is as follows:

- Approximately 1,400 market rate units
- 512 tax credit units
- 622 subsidized units
- 2,478 student-oriented units
- 534 assisted living/congregate senior units provided in a separate section

There are eleven identified rental projects in Mankato, North Mankato and Eagle Lake that have received federal low income housing tax credits. These projects represent a mix of both new construction and rehabilitation of existing rental buildings. They all provide moderate rent housing options, with few instances of any project-based assistance that can serve very low income people.

Four of the 11 projects involved in older rental properties that used the tax credit financing for renovations. This includes Colony Apartments of North Mankato.

The other tax credit projects utilized the assistance for new unit construction. This includes Hoover Estates and Northway Townhomes located in North Mankato.

Combined, the eleven tax credit projects have approximately 512 income restricted rental units operating under the tax credit program. In some projects, the actual number of units exceeds the requirement.

## MA-10 Number of Housing Units – 91.210(a)&(b)(2)

## Introduction

The 2013 Census estimates that North Mankato has 5,603 occupied housing units. of the 5,603 units 4,017 are owner occupied and 1,586 are renter occupied.

The City of North Mankato has had significant housing construction activity, with building permits issued for nearly 900 housing units between January 2000 and October 2013. For the 14-year period between 2000 and 2013 (partial), the City averaged approximately 64 units per year. However, much of this activity occurred in the first half of the last decade, and housing construction activity slowed after 2007. For the six-year period between 2008 and 2012, the annual average was just above 36 units per year. Year-to-date activity in 2013 has already surpassed the average achieved over the last six year.

Most of the construction activity has been in lower-density unit types, such as one unit or two unit structures. More than 71% of the units permitted since 2000 have been identified as single family homes, and would probably be detached single family homes. Presumably many of the two, three and four unit structures constructed since 2000 represent twin homes and town house units also intended for owner-occupancy.

North Mankato has had some multifamily construction activity, although tenure information is not always available from the summary reports. Since 2008, at least 29 rental units can be identified. The largest single project has 16 units, built in four four-plex units on Arlington Trail. This project, as planned, would eventually have 13 four-plexes, built over a number of years.

The remaining 13 rental units since 2008 are in mixed-use, commercial buildings with a residential component. Four luxury rental units exist in Marigold Apartments, permitted in 2010. There were nine rental units permitted in 2013 in a Dollar Store building renovation.

Most of the probably rental housing construction also occurred in the early part of the last decade. In 2002 there were 106 multifamily units that were issued a building permit. It is believed that most of these units were in senior housing with services projects, including Oak Terrace and Willow Pointe.

Describe the number and targeting (income level/type of family served) of units assisted with federal, state, and local programs.

The HRA provides rental assistance to approximately 200-225 families in North Mankato.

Provide an assessment of units expected to be lost from the affordable housing inventory for any reason, such as expiration of Section 8 contracts.

Sunrise Village in upper North Mankato was recently sold and the new owner plans to renovate the property and raise the rents so the units will no longer be Section 8 eligible. There are 132 units at this property and as many as 50 units have housed Section 8 eligible families.

Hoover Estates also has new ownership. There are 72 units at this property and as many as 50 units house Section 8 Eligible families. This is one of the few properties with larger - 3 bedroom units. The new owner is currently accepting Section 8 but that may change if the rents are increased and the units no longer work with the Section 8 program payment standards.

## Does the availability of housing units meet the needs of the population?

According to SCMMCHRA, there is a need for more affordable units as well as one-bedroom units and three bedroom and larger units.

There are approximately 305 Vouchers being utilized in Nicollet County, and more than half of these are typically used in North Mankato.

Due to budget limitations and long wait times, the waiting lists were closed to new applicants in the Mankato, Blue Earth County and Nicollet County programs. In Mankato/Blue Earth County there were 144 names still on a waiting list, although no new households had been issued a Voucher in 2013.

## Describe the need for specific types of housing:

According to those who work in the subsidized housing area, there is a need for affordable, one-bedroom units as well as larger 3, 4 and 5 bedroom units. There is also a need for handicapped accessible units in all sizes. There is no housing specifically for veterans.

## MA-15 Housing Market Analysis: Cost of Housing - 91.210(a)

## Introduction

The federal tax credit program places maximum rent limitations on assisted units. All of the tax credit projects in Mankato, North Mankato, and Eagle Lake have estimated gross rents that are well below the maximum limit. The maximum rent limits provided are for both Blue Earth County and for Nicollet County, for projects placed in service prior to 2009.

One-bedroom \$440-\$685, \$545-\$805 for 2 bedrooms, \$630-\$990 for 3 bedrooms.

The large majority of tax credit units in the Mankato area have gross rents that are below the limits set for households at 50% of the median income level, although federal guidelines would allow most units to go as high as 60% of median income.

## Is there sufficient housing for households at all income levels?

Wilder reports rates of employment have changed dramatically from 2000 to 2012; homeless adults employed at the time of the survey decreased from 41% to 24%; those working 35+ hours/week decreased from 26% to 8%. The number of homeless older adults employed is 13% (although nearly all of the older adults surveyed were age 66 or younger). Many rely on Social Security or General Assistance as their only income source. More than 1/4 of these adults said they needed assistance in applying or reapplying for benefits. Some turn to family members for assistance. However, 43% reported they are disconnected from their families. Wilder reports two of the three most common reasons adults left their last housing: 38% could not afford it and 32% lost their job or had their hours cut. Only 9% of homeless veterans are employed full-time. Fifty-three percent have been unemployed for over a year.

## How is affordability of housing likely to change considering changes to home values and/or rents?

County Emergency Assistance and Emergency General Assistance (EA) - Although the need for emergency dollars is increasing because of lower household incomes and higher rent/utility costs, county EA programs experienced a slight loss of funding from 2012 to 2014. Many counties reported funding was gone three months before the end of their fiscal periods. Almost 100% of EA funds were used for rents and utilities. Reasons for denials are not tracked, but anecdotal information indicates it is because households are unable to verify 50% of income was used for basic needs and/or housing was not cost effective.

## How do HOME rents / Fair Market Rent compare to Area Median Rent? How might this impact your strategy to produce or preserve affordable housing?

In December of 2013, Community Partners Research, Inc. analyzed the housing needs in the Mankato/North Mankato Area. Fifty-two percent of the FHPAP households enrolled in the region are served in these two cities and corresponding counties. Since 2010 there was an average growth in Greater Mankato of approximately 100 renter households per year. Nearly 50% of renters in Greater Mankato had annual incomes below \$25,000. More than 55% of rental households paid more than 30% of their income for their housing. Over the past 6 years the annual average multifamily/rental unit construction has been 118 units. Only one project, Sibley Park Apartments, has added to the supply of income-restricted housing. The vacancy rate is 0.7%. The 2013 rental survey found no vacant units in subsidized developments.

The study indicates the need for 147 to 160 rental units each year to address household growth and to increase the vacancy rate and allow for greater unit choice for renters. The ideal distribution of units would be matched to the financial ability to pay for area renters. Nearly 42% of all renter households have an income below \$20,000 and an affordable unit would be defined as a gross rent below \$500. Approximately 20% of renters would need an affordable unit priced between \$500 and \$650 per month. Although the research endorses more moderately-priced rental housing, it is probable that most of currently proposed units will have two-bedroom gross rents of \$1,000 or more.

### Discussion

Lutheran Social Service's Crisis Nursery provides families experiencing a crisis the option of placing their children in foster care for up to 72 hours. This service is available 24/7. In 2014, 111 days of service were provided to 51 families in the region. The main stressors reported for calling the Crisis Nursery are: housing, job, medical and parenting stress.

MVAC delivers Energy Assistance Program (EAP) in all 9 counties in our region. This past heating season EAP benefits (primary, crisis and Energy Related Repairs) for 7653 households of which thirty-three percent were at-risk of or without a utility and received a crisis grant of up to \$500. Even after these utility funds are accessed, many households who contact MVAC for FHPAP are struggling with both rental arrears and a pending utility disconnect.

## MA-20 Housing Market Analysis: Condition of Housing – 91.210(a) Introduction

North Mankato's oldest housing stock is located throughout residential areas in Lower North, in the southeast portion of the city. According to the 2008-2012 American Community Survey, In 2012, roughly 57.8% (3,280 units) of the City's units were constructed before 1980. Just 14.9% of the housing units in North Mankato were built before 1940. The number of new housing units built since 1990 is generally consistent with the County and State, with 30.2% for North Mankato compared with 30.5% for the County and 27.9% for the State.

The median value of owner-occupied housing units in North Mankato in 2012 was \$166,500 up 38.1% (or \$45,900) from the median value in 2000 of \$120,600. Most housing in North Mankato is valued in the range of \$150,000 to \$199,999. In comparison to low and moderate valued housing, there is a relatively small choice of higher valued housing units in North Mankato, as 92.8% of housing is valued below \$300,000. The median value of owner-occupied housing in Nicollet County was \$169,200 and \$194,300 in the State of Minnesota.

## Need for Owner and Rental Rehabilitation

The average lifespan of a house, according to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), is 40-50 years without significant annual maintenance. Of the total 5,491 housing units in North Mankato (U.S. Census Bureau, 2008-2012 American Community Survey), 2,256 or 41% have well exceeded or will exceed in the next 5 years the 50 year mark.

Older housing stock requires more maintenance and the owner incurs higher costs. Without the maintenance, the units will become substandard and renovations will be required to keep them livable and compliant with city building codes.

## Estimated Number of Housing Units Occupied by Low or Moderate Income Families with LBP Hazards

The estimated total number of housing units in North Mankato with lead-based paint is 2,309. That is 46% of the total housing units. It can be estimated that 41% or 946 of these households are of low to moderate incomes.

### Discussion

Due to the age of residential properties in Lower North, the City of North Mankato plans to allocate funding for homeowners interested in making improvements to their homes from the Community Development Block Grant Program. The program is available to income qualified homeowners and available loan amounts will require matching funds from the homeowner. Qualifying improvements include those that make homes more energy efficient, safe, habitable and accessible to physically challenged occupants. Example improvements include, but are not limited to, lead based paint interim control, defective plumbing, heating or electrical systems, rotted siding, porches or steps, wall repair, floor coverings, paint, roofing, windows and doors, ramps and bathroom accessibility conversions.

Describe the public housing agency's strategy for improving the living environment of lowand moderate-income families residing in public housing:

The South Central Minnesota Multi-County HRA provides the following programs:

HCV Rental Assistance Program- This program will help pay your rent if you are an incomeeligible family or individual. Participants need to find their own rental units. Tenants receive rental assistance based on income and household size. Eligible families and individuals pay 30% to 40% of their gross annual income towards the gross rent. The HRA pays the balance of the rent.

HCV Homeownership- This program assists first-time homeowners with their monthly homeownership expenses. Homeownership participants must be a qualified applicant or participant in the HCV Rental Assistance Program.

Family Self-Sufficiency (FSS)- This is a work-incentive program for clients receiving rental assistance through the HCV Program. The FSS Program Coordinator will work with you to set up a five-year plan that includes employment, education, and training goals. Every 6 months, these goals will be reviewed and revised to meet your needs.

Rental Assistance Program (RAP)- This is a state funded, referral-only, rental-subsidy program. A Service Provider shall develop and implement a transition plan for each household or individual to assist them in moving from RAP to self-sufficiency or to a rental assistance program that is not time-limited. Eligibility is income-based and limited to a maximum of \$250 subsidy per household, with a limit of five years.

The City of North Mankato will continue to maintain and build a strong relationship with the SCMMCHRA. Through this relationship, open communication will continue to discuss the needs of low-to moderate-income households.

Describe mainstream services, such as health, mental health, and employment services to the extent those services are use to complement services targeted to homeless persons

The Wilder Study shows that from 2009 to 2012, adults with serious mental illness increased from 36% to 55% and those experiencing chronic physical health conditions went from 39% to 51%. Homeless children are likely to: have more health problems, more trouble developing healthy relationships, more difficulty staying on track in school and be homeless as adults. Twenty-six percent of homeless veterans experience problems accessing medical care. Wilder reports that persons with a history of incarceration (95% of homeless females and 85% of homeless males) experience difficulties early in life such as physical or sexual abuse, out-of-home placements in childhood and/or becoming a parent before age 18. These ex-offenders were twice as likely to have spent time in a mental health facility and three times as likely to have spent time in a chemical dependency treatment facility.

The South Central Crisis Center provides mental health services and temporary, short-term placement for persons experiencing a mental health crisis. They continue to see people with housing issues, either due directly to their mental/physical health or due to other dynamics that may include marital issues and evictions. They serve people who are chronically homeless and come to the crisis center following hospitalizations. These patients are often discharged to long-term homeless units or board and lodges. These placements must happen quickly because of the short limit on length of stay at the crisis center.

List and describe services and facilities that meet the needs of homeless persons, particularly chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth. If the services and facilities are listed on screen SP-40 Institutional Delivery Structure or screen MA-35 Special Needs Facilities and Services, describe how these facilities and services specifically address the needs of these populations.

Blue Earth County/MVAC will serve youth, singles and families. They serve all racial and ethnic groups, veterans, persons with disabilities, offenders and other sub-populations. Since youth may have a harder time obtaining and maintaining housing because of recently entering the labor market, a lack of credit/rental history and limited life skills, MVAC will assist these households with up to an additional \$200. This allows them to provide both rent and deposit if the youth is securing housing or to pay a portion of the second month's rent for youth facing evictions thus enhancing the stabilization of their housing.

Blue Earth and Nicollet Counties have access to assistance programs that can help lower income seniors acquire the services they need to avoid moving into a skilled nursing home facility. The City of North Mankato has a number of senior housing with services units including Monarch Meadows, Oak Terrace West, Oak Terrace Assisted Living, and Oak Terrace Memory Care.

## Negative Effects of Public Policies on Affordable Housing and Residential Investment

There are many policies that can affect the affordability of housing in a community. These include taxes, fees, utilities, land use and zoning, and building codes. Developers are also discouraged to build affordable or public housing because of the specific criteria, paperwork, time, and money necessary. The City of North Mankato has worked to reduce these barriers in a variety of ways:

- Help finance the Minnesota Valley Action Council's housing and education programs
- Apply for annual funding from the Minnesota Housing Finance Agency to provide assistance
- The use of City of North Mankato grant money when available to provide down payment and closing cost assistance
- Reduce minimum lot sizes to help accommodate new affordable housing construction
- Allow for flexible setbacks for affordable housing projects

Fair Housing—Title VIII of the Civil Rights Act of 1968, known as the *Fair Housing Act* prohibits discrimination in the sale, rental, and financing of dwellings, and in other housing-related transactions, based on race, color, national origin, religion, sex, familial status (including children under the age of 18 living with parents or legal custodians, pregnant women, and people securing custody of children under the age of 18), and handicap.

In general, the laws, regulations, and administrative policies in the City of North Mankato comply with the Federal Fair Housing guidelines and do not appear to adversely affect the location, availability, or accessibility of housing choices for North Mankato citizens based on their race, color, national origin, religion, sex, family status, or handicap.

The Consolidated Plan regulations (24 CFR 91) require each state and local government to submit a certification that is affirmatively furthering fair housing. This means that it will (1) conduct an analysis of impediments to fair housing choice; (2) take appropriate actions to overcome the effects of impediments identified through that analysis; and (3) maintain records reflecting the analysis and actions.

North Mankato is a growing community that focuses on affordable and fair housing. Due to high infrastructure costs and lack of state and federal funding to assist in development, providing affordable housing and ensuring fair housing is a difficult and complex task. It is of high priority to the City however, and all accommodations are made to provide the most effective and efficient affordable and fair housing opportunities possible.

### Fair Housing

Title VIII of the Civil Rights Act of 1968, known as the *Fair Housing Act* prohibits discrimination in the sale, rental, and financing of dwellings, and in other housing-related transactions, based on race, color, national origin, religion, sex, familial status (including children under the age of 18 living with parents or legal custodians, pregnant women, and people securing custody of children under the age of 18), and handicap.

In general, the laws, regulations, and administrative policies in the City of North Mankato comply with the Federal Fair Housing guidelines and do not appear to adversely affect the location, availability, or accessibility of housing choices for North Mankato citizens based on their race, color, national origin, religion, sex, family status, or handicap.

The Consolidated Plan regulations (24 CFR 91) require each state and local government to submit a certification that is affirmatively furthering fair housing. This means that it will (1) conduct an analysis of impediments to fair housing choice; (2) take appropriate actions to overcome the effects of impediments identified through that analysis; and (3) maintain records reflecting the analysis and actions.

North Mankato is a growing community that focuses on affordable and fair housing. Due to high infrastructure costs and lack of state and federal funding to assist in development, providing affordable housing and ensuring fair housing is a difficult and complex task. It is of

high priority to the City however, and all accommodations are made to provide the most effective and efficient affordable and fair housing opportunities possible.

### Strategy to Remove or Ameliorate the Barriers to Affordable Housing

As mentioned previously, there are many policies that can affect the affordability of housing in a community. The City of North Mankato has experienced very few if any negative effects that policies can have on affordable housing. The City of North Mankato has worked to and will continue to reduce these barriers in a variety of ways:

- Help finance the Minnesota Valley Action Council's housing education programs
- Apply for annual funding from the Minnesota Finance Agency to provide assistance
- The use of City of North Mankato grant money when available to provide down payment and closing costs assistance
- Reduce minimum lot sizes to help accommodate new affordable housing construction
- Allow for flexible setbacks for affordable housing projects

### Actions to address LBP hazards and increase access to housing without LBP hazards

As part of the Community Development Block Grant Program the City of North Mankato has allocated funding for homeowners interested in making improvements to their homes. Lead Based Paint interim control is addressed as a qualified improvement to make one's home energy efficient, safe, habitable, and accessible to physically challenged occupants.

### How are the actions listed above related to the extent of lead poisoning and hazards?

Lead was a popular ingredient in paint until it was banned in 1978. Lead paint still continues to be a problem nearly 40 years after it was banned due to its prevalence in older housing.

Lead poisoning is a serious threat to children and is a leading environmental disease. Exposure can cause serious health problems that severely affect mental and physical development.

According to the 2009-2013 American Community Survey, there are a total of 5,890 housing units located in North Mankato and 56% of which were built prior to 1979. The study "Comprehensive and Workable Plan for the Abatement of Lead-Based Paint in Privately Owned Housing, Report to Congress, HUD, December 7, 1990" states that 90% of homes built before 1940 contain lead-based paint, as do 80% of units between 1940 and 1959, and 62% of those built between 1960 and 1978.

The estimated total number of housing units in North Mankato with lead-based paint is 2,309. That is 46% of the total housing units. It can be estimated that 41% or 946 of these households are of low to moderate incomes. These households are limited on their options to fix the problem due to their low and moderate incomes which emphasizes the importance of aiding the solution.

### How are the actions listed above integrated into housing policies and procedures?

The City of North Mankato has on staff building inspectors trained in lead-based paint removal to inform and educate homeowners of the available options for safely removing LBP. Homeowners requesting permits for remodeling and other improvements are required to apply for licenses which permit the project to move forward only once the inspection (including a test for LBP) has been completed. The City of North Mankato will continue education for homeowners of LBP procedures and hazards.

The City of North Mankato has developed an anti-poverty strategy as part of the Consolidated Plan. Poverty can be defined as the condition of not having the means to afford basic human needs such as clean water, nutrition, health care, clothing and shelter. The poverty line is defined by the Office of Management and Budget annually in relation to the community. The City understands the negative effects poverty has on individuals, families, and a community as a whole.

The City of North Mankato addresses the issue of poverty in multiple ways. The City has a goal enhancing job creation and economic development to reduce poverty. This is done by fostering economic development that is diverse and strong for the foreseeable future and working with the workforce development center. By providing financial opportunities, creation of high quality jobs, job training, and entrepreneurial services, poverty is combated. The Head Start program is active in the community as well. Studies have shown this program has long-term beneficial effects on reducing crime and poverty and improved education.

Recipients of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds will be required to complete an agreement with the City of North Mankato. This agreement outlines the amount of funding received, the guidelines and requirements necessary for use of the funds, and the process for review and monitoring. Each payment request will be reviewed individually as the recipient submits for payment.

The Community Development and Finance Departments of the City of North Mankato are responsible for monitoring all recipients of CDBG funding. Monitoring standards include annual record keeping, program income, fair housing standards, labor standards, and ensuring HUD's National objectives are met (benefiting low-and moderate-income persons, aiding the prevention or elimination of slums and blight, or meeting community development needs having particular urgency because existing conditions pose a serious and immediate threat). For public improvement projects, the City will monitor bonding, insurance, and related requirements. All projects will be evaluated with the City's Consolidated Plan to ensure compliance with the goals and strategies identified. Each contract will allow for on-site inspections to ensure long-term regulations and housing codes are being met.

The City of North Mankato will have an annual independent audit completed as required by HUD. There will be an annual public hearing reviewing activities and accomplishments from the previous year (CAPER).

These statutory tort limits apply regardless of whether the city purchases the optional excess liability coverage.

- If the member waives the statutory tort limits and does not purchase excess liability coverage, a single claimant could potentially recover up to \$2,000,000 for a single occurrence. (Under this option, the tort cap liability limits are waived to the extent of the member's liability coverage limits, and the LMCIT per occurrence limit is \$2 million.) The total all claimants would be able to recover for a single occurrence to which the statutory tort limits apply would also be limited to \$2,000,000, regardless of the number of claimants.
- If the member waives the statutory tort limits and purchases excess liability coverage, a single claimant could potentially recover an amount up to the limit of the coverage purchased. 
Subject: Approval of Plans for the Lookout Drive Reconstruction and Roundabout Project

Project No. 14-03-CDEF

On the agenda for the April 6 City Council Meeting is a resolution approving plans and specifications for the Project No. 14-03-CDEF - Lookout Drive Reconstruction and Roundabout Project and authorizing advertisement for bids. Since the plan set for this project consists of 186 plan sheets, it is not practical to review the plans in detail with the council at the meeting. Instead, I am providing the following review of the overall project scope, proposed timelines, estimated project costs and project funding:

# **<u>Project Scope</u>** - The project includes the following major elements:

- Lookout Drive from a point just north of Commerce Drive to the south side of Howard Drive:
  - Complete reconstruction of Lookout Drive from a point just north of Commerce Drive to the south side of the Howard Drive intersection (concrete pavement).
  - Construction of two "teardrop" roundabouts located at the eastbound and westbound Highway 14 ramp intersections with Lookout Drive (concrete pavement).
  - Construction of a "yield-right" turn lane for northbound traffic on Lookout Drive turning right onto Howard Drive.
  - Improvements to the Highway 14 overpass bridge, including resurfacing the bridge deck, replacement of the concrete barriers and installation of decorative metal railings, and other miscellaneous improvements.
  - Construction of new 8-foot wide trails on both sides of Lookout Drive between Commerce Drive and Howard Drive, including across the bridge.
  - o Minor storm sewer improvements
  - Striping and signing
  - o New street lights
- Lookout Drive –from a point just north of Commerce Drive to Carol Court:
  - o Edge mill and 2" bituminous overlay
  - Upgrade traffic signal systems at Commerce Drive and Marie Lane to be ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) compliant
  - o Upgrade sidewalk and pedestrian ramps at all street intersections to be ADA compliant
  - Striping and signing
  - o New street lighting (alternate bid)



#### **Project Timeline:**

- The plans are currently being reviewed by Mn/DOT in St. Paul and the Mn/DOT Agreements Unit is preparing a cooperative agreement. The project cannot be advertised until plan review is complete, so the following dates may change.
- Scheduled Bid opening date May 7<sup>th</sup>, 2015
- Mn/DOT Concurrence on Award and Cooperative agreement executed June 1<sup>st</sup>
- Begin Construction June 15<sup>th</sup> (approx.)
- Complete mill & overlay portion of the project end of August (prior to school start in fall)
- Complete reconstruction/roundabouts/bridge improvements mid November

### **Detour Routes:**

• Reconstruction/roundabout portion of the project (north of Commerce Drive to Howard Drive) will be closed to vehicular and pedestrian traffic - traffic will generally be routed around reconstruction area using Commerce Drive, Lor Ray Drive, Carlson Drive and CSAH 41 (Rockford Road)

Mill & overlay portion (Commerce Drive and south) will remain open to traffic during construction - at least one lane each direction

#### **Background**

On February 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2015, the City Council was provided with an explanation of the proposed wastewater interconnection agreement extension staff has been drafting with the City of Mankato. At that time, four remaining issues were identified as needing to be resolved prior to executing the agreement that included finalizing the SAC charge, determining how funding for depreciation on bonded equipment will be charged, the allocation of reserve capacity, and cost projections. The purpose of this memo is to provide feedback on these issues and recommend the City Council authorize the City Administrator and Mayor to execute the wastewater interconnection agreement.

### **Reserve Capacity**

At this time, North Mankato has 2.0 million gallons in reserve capacity which is approximately double the amount discharged into the Mankato Treatment Works each year. This reserve allows sufficient capacity for the community to continue to develop. Under the new agreement, costs are allocated by flow and the reserve capacity of the plant is available to all partner communities. As a result, while no fixed reserve amount is allocated to North Mankato in this extension, no limit on growth is imposed by the agreement.

#### Sewer Access Charge (SAC)

For newly platted developments, a SAC charge will be imposed of \$500 per residential dwelling unit in 2015 and will increase to \$1600 in 2019. Total SAC revenue from all regional partners will is estimated to be \$83,000 in 2015 and \$248,000 in 2019. The fees collected will be remitted to Mankato to reduce the charges associated with bonded indebtedness and represent a first step at allocating costs currently imposed on existing rate payers to new users for reserved capacity at the plant.

#### **Depreciation on Bonded Capital Equipment**

The new agreement includes charges previously unpaid by North Mankato for depreciation on bonded capital equipment. These new charges represent a previous conflict between the two cities regarding the equitability of charging depreciation on bonded capital equipment because North Mankato residents already pay debt service costs associated with the equipment being depreciated. The City of Mankato maintains these charges are necessary to replace aging equipment at the plant and articulate a desire to reduce debt issued for portions of capital replacement originally financed with bonds. While fair reasons exist on both sides over the issue on whether charges for depreciation on bonded capital equipment are equitable, it is unlikely the City of Mankato will concede to not charging North Mankato a portion of these costs for the next five year extension.

These new costs represent an uncertainty to rate structures in North Mankato because depending on items placed on the depreciation schedule over an unidentified period of time, year to year charges for the treatment of wastewater will fluctuate. This uncertainty led staff to request depreciation on bonded capital be decreased from 100% of the assets value to a reduced percentage that may be gradually increased over time. This will provide more stability in rate structures, additional SAC fees to be collected, and allow capacity for increased costs associated with depreciation costs to be realized as debt payments for the Wastewater plant decrease in 2019 and 2020.

# SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM INTERCONNECTION AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF MANKATO AND NORTH MANKATO

THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into this \_\_\_day of \_\_\_\_\_\_, 2015 by and between the City of Mankato, a municipal corporation of Blue Earth County, Minnesota, and the <u>City of North Mankato</u> (the Customer Community), a municipal corporation of Minnesota.

In consideration of the mutual covenants and conditions contained herein, the parties hereto agree as follows:

# I. PURPOSE OF AGREEMENT

The City of Mankato agrees to permit the interconnection of the City of North Mankato Sanitary Sewer Collection System with the City of Mankato Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP) and to convey and treat the wastewater delivered to the City of Mankato WWTP by the City of North Mankato on the terms and conditions as established in this Agreement.

# II. DEFINITION OF TERMS

- A. **Agreement.** Agreement means this contract for the interconnection of sanitary sewer systems between the City of Mankato and the City of North Mankato.
- B. **Allocated Capacity.** Is the average of the Average Wet Weather (AWW) flow data available from the previous ten years and includes a standard deviation of 1 to account for infill and fluctuation in flows. The allocated capacity is adjusted annually.
- C. **Annual Flow.** Is the total flow from January 1<sup>st</sup> through December 31<sup>st</sup>.
- D. **Average Daily Flow.** Is the total annual flow divided by 365 days. The average daily flow design capacity of the Mankato Wastewater Treatment Facility is 9.38 million gallons per day (MGD).
- E. **Average Wet Weather Flow (AWW).** Is the maximum average flow for 30 consecutive days. The permitted average wet weather flow for the Mankato Wastewater Treatment Facility is 11.25 MGD.
- F. Average Annual Flow. The average of all daily flows.

- G. Carbonaceous Biochemical Oxygen Demand (CBOD). The quantity of oxygen utilized in the biochemical oxidation of organic matter under standard laboratory procedure in five (5) days at twenty (20) degrees Centigrade, expressed in terms of weight and concentration (milligrams per liter, mg/1).
- H. **Customer Community.** Any one, group, or all of the cities, townships, sanitary districts served by the Mankato Treatment System and represented in this Agreement.
- I. **Customer Community Collection System.** The system of sewers, force mains, lift stations and appurtenances, constructed, owned, operated and maintained by the Customer Community which are intended to carry only liquid and water-carried wastes from residences, commercial buildings, industrial plants and institutions located within the service area of the Customer Community.
- J. **Design Capacity.** Capacity of the Mankato WWTP to treat wastewater consistent with all requirements of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act as amended, the National Pollution Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit, and all other requirements established by the City of Mankato without incurring unreasonable operating expense or causing damage to the Mankato WWTP.
- K. **Fixed Costs**: Includes debt and interest payments, bonded and non-bonded debt depreciation. Depreciation is annually adjusted. Depreciation is the annual adjusted depreciation minus the annual SAC revenue. Fixed expenses are charged based on the allocated flow capacity of each customer community.
- L. **Flow Allocation.** Maximum wastewater flow that the City of Mankato and each Customer Community are allowed to discharge into the Mankato Treatment system.
- M. **Industrial Strength Waste.** Gaseous, liquid and solid wastes resulting from industrial or manufacturing processes, trade or business or from the development, recovery and processing of natural resources, as distinct from residential or normal domestic strength wastes. Industrial strength waste includes all wastes which are not of "normal domestic strength" as defined in this Article.
- N. **Infiltration.** Water entering the sanitary sewer system (including building drains and pipes) from the ground through sources such as, but not limited to, defective pipes, pipe joints, connections and manhole walls.

- O. **Inflow.** Water, other than wastewater, that enters a sanitary sewer system (including building drains) from sources such as, but not limited to, roof leaders, cellar drains, yard and area drains, foundation drains, drains from springs and swampy areas, manhole covers, cross-connections from storm sewers, catch basins, surface runoff, street wash waters or drainage.
- P. **Infiltration/Inflow (I/I).** The total quantity of water from both Infiltration and Inflow.
- Q. **Mankato City Code.** Mankato's City Code is a collection of ordinances that establishes city laws and regulations. It provides information on the roles of officers, administrative departments, city committees and describes City Council meeting procedures. In addition, the City Code addresses utility rates, licensing requirements and regulations, public safety, planning and zoning and city financing.
- R. **Mankato Collection System.** The system of sewers, force mains, lift stations and appurtenances, constructed, owned, operated and maintained by the City of Mankato which are intended to carry only liquid and water-carried wastes from residences, commercial buildings, industrial plants and institutions.
- S. **Mankato Treatment System.** The entire wastewater system operated and maintained by the City of Mankato which includes the combination of both the Mankato Collection System and the City of Mankato constructed, owned, operated and maintained WWTP.
- T. **Mankato WWTP**. The City of Mankato constructed, owned, operated and maintained wastewater treatment plant.
- U. MPCA. Minnesota Pollution Control Agency.
- V. **Normal Domestic Strength Waste.** Wastewater that is primarily introduced by residential users with a CBOD concentration not greater than two hundred sixty (260) mg/l and a total suspended solids (TSS) concentration not greater than two hundred eighty (280) mg/l. The concentration limits are subject to periodic review and may change to meet Mankato Treatment System regulatory and performance requirements. The definition in Chapter 3 of the Mankato City Code supersedes the definition in this Agreement.
- W. **Person.** The State or any agency or institution thereof, any municipality, governmental subdivision, public or private corporation, individual partnership or other entity, including, but not limited to any association,

- commission or interstate body and including any officer or governing or managing body of any municipality, governmental subdivision or public or private corporation or other entity.
- X. **Pretreatment.** The process of reducing the amount of pollutants, eliminating pollutants or altering the nature of pollutant properties in wastewater to a less harmful state prior to introducing such pollutants into the Customer Community Collection System or the Mankato Treatment System.
- Y. **Sewer Availability Charge (SAC).** The SAC revenue collected by the City of Mankato is used to finance the reserved capacity portion of the capital costs of the Wastewater Treatment Facility, either directly, as pay as you go funding, or as debt service payments.
- Z. **State.** State of Minnesota.
- AA. **Total Suspended Solids (TSS).** The total suspended matter that floats on the surface of, or is suspended in, water, wastewater or other liquids and which is removable by a standard glass fiber filter.
- BB. **USEPA.** United States Environmental Protection Agency.
- CC. **User.** Any person, who discharges, causes or permits the discharge or placement of wastewater into the Customer Community system or the Mankato Treatment System.
- DD. User Charge System (UCS). The system of user and sewer service charges established and adopted by the City of Mankato, and codified in the Mankato City Code, Section 3.71, levies charges on users of the Mankato Treatment System for the user's proportionate share of the costs, associated with the Mankato Treatment System. The UCS for the use of the Mankato treatment system has fixed and variable cost components. Charges made to customer communities are assessed on flow only, unless the Customer community contributes wastewater in excess of their allocated load based on "normal domestic strength". The UCS for the use of the Mankato collection system is based on the portion of the Customer Community's linear feet (LF) of piping shared within the City of Mankato. The collection system charge will be assessed to all customer communities that use the City of Mankato's Collection System. The UCS includes user and sewer service charges, which generate revenue for billing administration, infiltration/inflow, operation. maintenance (including replacement), and a debt service charge, which generates revenue for the repayment of capital-related costs of the Mankato Treatment System and for the annual depreciation transfer of bonded and

non-bonded capital replacements for the wastewater plant. See depreciation Exhibit A1.

- EE. **Variable Costs:** include salaries and benefits, overhead, administration, prorated administration charges for public works and general city administration, supplies and equipment, chemicals, utilities, biosolids handling, insurance premium transfers, and general and capital maintenance. Variable expenses can vary from year to year based on the facility's operational and maintenance needs or flows. Expenditures directly related and proportionate to the daily flow include: chemicals, power, natural gas, water, and hauling of biosolids. These variable costs are charged based on the total observed flow, million gallons (MG), sent to the treatment plant from January 1st through December 31st. The variable expenses related to operating and maintaining the treatment facilities and are charged based on the allocated flow capacity for each customer community.
- FF. **Wastewater.** All liquid or water-carried waste products from whatever source derived, together with such groundwater infiltration and surface water inflow as may be present.

\*For a more extensive list of wastewater related definitions, please refer the City of Mankato Code.

### III. POINT OF INTERCONNECTION

- A. Interconnections from the City of North Mankato Collection System to the Mankato Treatment System are limited to those locations specifically defined in this agreement. There shall be no additional points of interconnection unless otherwise expressly agreed to in writing by the City of Mankato.
- B. The City of North Mankato Collection System is permitted to connect at the locations listed and shown in **Exhibit 1 to this Agreement**.
- C. The City of North Mankato Collection System and the Mankato Collection System downstream of the point of interconnection shall in the judgment of the City of Mankato, be of sufficient size and capacity to accommodate the needs of the City of Mankato as well as to accept and convey the wastewater from the City of North Mankato in accordance with the parameters established in this Agreement.
- D. Maintenance and costs associated with the point of interconnection are the responsibility of the City of North Mankato as identified in **Exhibit 1 to this Agreement**. In addition the City of North Mankato is responsible for maintaining the structure in which their respective flow discharges into. If

the City of Mankato determines that the point of interconnection including the interconnection structure are not being maintained properly, the City of Mankato will as practical, notify City of North Mankato 24 hours in advance to arrange for maintenance and repairs. The associated costs will be the sole responsibility of the City of North Mankato.

E. **Exhibit 1 of this Agreement** identifies any structures that the City of Mankato agrees to operate and maintain for the City of North Mankato and the method for reimbursement by the City of North Mankato to the City of Mankato for capital and annual operation maintenance costs.

# IV. <u>DESIGNATED SEWER SERVICE AREA</u>

- A. The parties recognize and agree that the capacity of the Mankato Treatment System is limited or finite. As such, the parties agree that the municipal sanitary sewer service provided by the City of North Mankato shall be limited to include only sewer service within the specific designated sewer service area as established in this Agreement.
- B. The designated sanitary sewer service area for the City of North Mankato shall be limited to the corporate limits of the City of North Mankato or the City of North Mankato Sanitary District included as **Exhibit 2 of this Agreement**. The City of North Mankato agrees that it shall, by adoption of ordinances and employment of suitable methods or such other actions as are necessary, not extend or allow any extension or interconnection with its collection system from outside the designated sewer service area established in this Article, unless annexation of the additional area proposed for sewer service first occurs and provided the additional service area will not exceed any discharge limitations established in this Agreement without written permission by the City of Mankato.
- C. The design capacity of the Mankato WWTP is based upon the design parameters and projected population growth for the City of Mankato and Customer Communities defined by planning documents listed in **Exhibit 3** of this Agreement. Table IV lists the flow projections for the City of Mankato and Customer Communities updated for this Agreement. Such flow estimates are projections only and actual wastewater treatment service is limited specifically to the discharge limitations in Article VI of this Agreement and all other terms and conditions established in this Agreement.
- D. Prior to renewal of the Sanitary Sewer Interconnection Agreement between the City of Mankato and the City of North Mankato, the City of North Mankato shall provide the City of Mankato population projections as outlined in Exhibit 3. The population projections shall be submitted to the

City of Mankato 12 months prior to the expiration of the current agreement. The agreement will not be renewed until a comprehensive plan has been submitted to the City of Mankato. The comprehensive plan shall include, but not be limited to the following:

- 1. Projected population growth (5, 10 and 20 year)
- 2. Projected new areas of development
- 3. Potential new industrial connections
- 4. Projected total number of new connections (5, 10 and 20 year)
- 5. Projected wastewater discharge flow to be sent to the Mankato Treatment System (5, 10 and 20 year)

# V. <u>CUSTOMER COMMUNITY COLLECTION SYSTEM: CONSTRUCTION,</u> <u>IMPROVEMENT, OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE REQUIREMENTS</u>

- A. The City of North Mankato, at its expense, shall design, plan, lay, install, construct, operate, maintain, inspect and keep in repair its own public sanitary sewer collection system, so that such facilities and all user connections thereto at all times strictly conform with all State and Federal laws and regulations, applicable ordinances of the City of Mankato, the State Plumbing Code and the terms of this Agreement.
- B. Any future additions, expansions, improvements or connections to the City of North Mankato Collection System shall be subject to review by the City of Mankato prior to construction or connection and shall at all times strictly conform with and be constructed in accordance with all State and Federal laws and regulations, applicable ordinances of the City of Mankato, the State Plumbing Code, and the terms of this Agreement. All costs incurred by the City of North Mankato in designing, constructing, replacing, expanding or improving pipes and other appurtenances necessary for delivering the

wastewater flow from the City of North Mankato system to the interconnection point as described in Article III shall be paid by the City of North Mankato.

- C. Prior to the construction, improvement, expansion or replacement of the City of North Mankato Collection System or any portion thereof by the City of North Mankato, the City of North Mankato shall, if required to submit plans and specifications for the proposed construction, improvement, expansion or replacement to the MPCA or another State agency, submit the same plans and specifications as are submitted to the MPCA or other agency to the City of Mankato for its review, with the submittal being as nearly simultaneous as practicable.
- D. Upon receipt of such proposed plans and specifications of the City of North Mankato by the City of Mankato, the City of Mankato shall have sixty (60) days to review and make any written objections, which the City of Mankato may have to the proposed plans and specifications. In the event of an objection, the City of Mankato shall specify in writing the reasons for its objection and provide a written report of those findings to the City of North Mankato.
- E. The City of Mankato shall base any objection to the proposed plans and specifications on their conformity with the standards and specifications established by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency for sanitary sewer collection system improvements and the 2004 Edition of the Recommended Standards for Wastewater Facilities (Ten State Standards) outlining policies for design, review and approval of plans and specificiations for wastewater collection facilities.
- F. The City of Mankato will not deny the City of North Mankato's request for expansion of their collection system on the basis of wastewater treatment capacity provided that the City of North Mankato's Average Annual Wet Weather Flow for the calendar year previous to the year in which the request is made did not exceed the flow allocation provided in Table VI and so long as the wastewater collection system has not exceeded flows and/or loadings 85% of the waste wter treatment facility's permitted capacity for flow or loadings.
- G. In the event of an objection, the City of North Mankato may resubmit its plans and specifications taking into consideration the City of Mankato's objections. Upon resubmittal by the City of North Mankato, the City of Mankato shall have an additional thirty (30) days from receipt of the resubmitted plans and specifications to comment.

Η. In the event that plans and specifications are not required to be submitted to the MPCA or another State agency for the construction, improvement, expansion or replacement of the City of North Mankato system or any portion thereof, the City of North Mankato recognizes that it is vital to the operation of the Mankato Treatment System to keep the City of Mankato informed of any changes that may affect the operation of the Mankato Treatment System. The City of North Mankato, therefore, agrees that it will establish procedures for review and evaluation of any plans that may affect the operation of the Mankato Treatment System by the City of Mankato prior to any construction, improvement, expansion or connection to the City of North Mankato system. The City of North Mankato shall establish the necessary procedures as part of its building permit issuance process that includes the wastewater discharge permit process to the Mankato Treatment System. The process shall include notification provided by the City of North Mankato to the City of Mankato of any new commercial or industrial projects or expansions. Upon receiving such notification, the City of Mankato shall determine whether a wastewater discharge permit is required in accordance with the provisions of Article XI. The City of North Mankato agrees that in no event shall any commercial or industrial building be connected to the City of North Mankato system until the City of Mankato has either (1) determined that a wastewater discharge permit is not required for the proposed project, or (2) if required, has issued a wastewater discharge permit for the proposed project.

### VI. EXTENT OF SERVICE

A. The parties hereto recognize that the capacity of the Mankato Treatment System is limited. The existing capacity of the Mankato WWTP is based upon the design criteria identified in the regulatory permits and planning documents listed in Exhibit 3 of this Agreement. Each Customer Community of the Mankato Treatment system is allocated flow based on the average annual and average wet weather flow (AWW) design capacity of the Mankato WWTP as listed in Table VI. The Mankato WWTP average annual design flow capacity is 9.38 mgd and the average annual wet weather flow capacity is 11.25 mgd.

Table VI will be updated annually. The allocated capacity in Table VI is the average of the Average Wet Weather (AWW) flow data available from the previous ten years and includes a standard deviation of 1 to account for infill and fluctuation in flows.

- B. Discharge of wastewater by the City of North Mankato to the Mankato Treatment System shall not exceed the flow limits listed in Table VI, except in conditions acknowledged by the City as significantly abnormal. Discharges in excess of these limits shall be considered in violation of this Agreement and subject to penalties under Section XV.
- C. The City of North Mankato shall be regulated for wastewater strength based on the concentration of CBOD, TSS, and other constituents in the City of North Mankato's wastewater deemed necessary to protect the Mankato Treatment System and for the City of Mankato to comply with regulatory standards. Any discharge in excess of the normal domestic strength waste concentrations defined in this Agreement shall be assessed a surcharge and be subject to penalties as defined under Article XV.
- D. The City of North Mankato shall under no circumstances allow, and shall take such actions as are necessary by ordinance or otherwise to prohibit, its collection system from receiving wastewater discharges in excess of the maximum flow or loading limits as stated in this Article, unless the City of Mankato expressly agrees otherwise in writing. The City of North Mankato agrees to voluntarily, or at the request of the City of Mankato, take such actions as are necessary, including suspension, restriction or termination of sewer service, to prohibit any user of the City of North Mankato system from exceeding the above discharge parameters. The City of Mankato reserves the right to restrict the rate of flow at the point of interconnection from the City of North Mankato system to strictly conform to the parameters provided in this Paragraph.
- E. The discharge flow and wastewater quality concentration limits established in this Article are subject to periodic review and may change based on the

procedures set out in this Article as conditions and wastewater treatment service needs among the users of the Mankato Treatment System change. Exhibit 3 of this Agreement defines the basis of capacity for the Mankato Wastewater Treatment System. The City Ordinance defines the wastewater quality concentration limits and basis for normal domestic strength waste. As service needs change among users, the allocated flows listed in Table VI for the City of North Mankato may need to be periodically reevaluated and adjusted as the City of North Mankato's wastewater treatment service needs change.

- F. The City of Mankato may from time to time review or increase the discharge parameters established in this Article based upon changing circumstances, in such event the City of Mankato shall notify each Customer Community 30 days in advance of such changes. In allocating flow to the City of North Mankato, the City of Mankato shall take into account the City of North Mankato's actual rate of flow during the previous ten (10) years, projected or anticipated increases or decreases in rate of flow for the City of North Mankato and all other users of the Mankato Treatment System, the original allocation among all users of the Mankato Treatment System, design capacity of the Mankato WWTP, remaining design capacity reserved for other users of the Mankato WWTP, and such other factors as in the judgment of the City of Mankato will fairly allocate capacity among all users of the Mankato Treatment System.
- G. The City of North Mankato agrees that it will strictly conform to and not exceed the maximum limits stated in this Article unless otherwise agreed to in writing by the City of Mankato. In the event that the City of North Mankato believes an additional allocation of flow is needed over and above the maximum parameters established in this Article, the City of North Mankato may request a flow allocation review by submitting a written request to the City of Mankato. The City of Mankato, upon receipt of such a request, shall reconsider the flow allocation for the City of North Mankato. The City of North Mankato may make a request for a Treatment System flow allocation increase once per year during the term of this Agreement. The City of Mankato shall afford the City of North Mankato the opportunity to present information about the City of North Mankato's anticipated flows. The City of North Mankato in its request shall include sufficient factual information to enable the City of Mankato to make an appropriate review of allocation needs in addition to supplying any additional information requested by the City of Mankato and cooperating with any independent investigation by the City of Mankato which the City of Mankato deems necessary or desirable.
- H. Should the City of North Mankato make a request for a Treatment System flow allocation review, the City of Mankato may increase the flow allocation

as requested should the City of Mankato determine, in its judgment, that the allocation increase is necessary and appropriate based on the City of Mankato's review of the circumstances, information presented by the City of North Mankato, and the factors for determining flow allocation as provided in this Article. The City of Mankato shall make a determination approving or denying the request and provide written notice thereof to the City of North Mankato within sixty (60) days of receipt of the written request, except that the period for review may be extended an additional sixty (60) days should the City of Mankato determine that the information submitted by the City of North Mankato is not adequate to make a determination or should the City of Mankato determine that additional review or investigation is necessary or desirable.

I. In the event of an approval, the City of Mankato may, based on its review and to the extent that the design capacity of the Mankato Treatment System allocated to all users of the Mankato Treatment System permits, assign the City of North Mankato an increased flow allocation at the level requested or at some lesser level which in the judgment of the City of Mankato is appropriate.

Under no circumstances shall the City of North Mankato increase or allow increased discharges exceeding the limits stated in this Article unless the City of North Mankato receives written notice of approval from the City of Mankato granting the capacity allocation increase. The letter of approval from the City of Mankato specifying the new discharge parameters shall be adopted by resolution of both governing bodies and by such actions becomes a part of this Agreement.

# VII. MONITORING AND MEASUREMENT OF SEWAGE

- A. All sewage discharged into the Mankato Treatment System from the City of North Mankato system shall be accurately monitored for strength and volume by acceptable metering and sampling equipment which shall be installed in a building or structure constructed by the City of North Mankato, at the City of North Mankato's expense, at or adjacent to the boundaries of the service area of the City of North Mankato or at such other site as may be mutually agreed upon. The location of the metering and sampling equipment shall be subject to review and approval by the City of Mankato.
- B. Each point of interconnection between the City of North Mankato Collection System and the Mankato Treatment system must be equipped with a monitoring station meeting the requirements set forth in this article.

- C. The City of Mankato will select the metering equipment. Each Customer Community will have the ability to select the contractor (s) to install the metering equipment. Flow meters selected will have the ability to communicate with the City of Mankato WWTP's control system. Capital costs associated with the installation of metering equipment will be the responsibility of the City of North Mankato.
- D. The City of Mankato, in its judgment and at its expense, may install, operate and maintain similar monitoring stations and may install, operate and maintain rate of flow restriction equipment or devices within or adjacent to the corporate limits of said City of Mankato at or near the point(s) of interconnection stated in Article III.
- E. The City of North Mankato shall operate and maintain the monitoring equipment and monitoring station. All required flow metering and sampling equipment shall be operational on a continuous basis and wastewater flow shall be measured on a continuous basis, with volumes totaled and recorded continuously. The reading and recording of results and collection and analysis of wastewater samples from the City of North Mankato's metering and sampling equipment shall be completed by the City of North Mankato. Wastewater samples shall be analyzed for CBOD, TSS and any other pollutants deemed necessary by the City of Mankato. Analysis of pollutants may be conducted by the City of Mankato at any time in a laboratory certified for such analyses by the State of Minnesota. A report shall be submitted by the City of Mankato to the City of North Mankato monthly.
- F. The City of Mankato will collect samples from the City of North Mankato's monitoring station at a frequency determined by the City of Mankato. The samples will be analyzed for constituents deemed necessary by the City of Mankato. Costs associated with sampling and analysis will be included in the operational budget of the Mankato Wastewater Treatment Facility..
- G. If it is determined by the City of Mankato that maintenance or operation of the metering equipment or metering station is unacceptable, the City of Mankato will provide 24 hour notice to the City of North Mankato to coordinate necessary repairs and take control of operation of the station. The cost for all such services shall be the responsibility of the City of North Mankato.
- H. The City of Mankato, upon reasonable notice first given to the City of North Mankato, shall have the right of access to the monitoring station, metering device, automatic sampler and any other recording instruments and may make any accuracy test or other inspections that it may deem necessary or desirable.

- I. On a bi-annual basis, the City of Mankato shall contract with a qualified flow metering calibration firm to have all metering devices calibrated. The cost of calibration services shall be distributed to the Customer Communities on a number of meters basis.
- J. If the City of Mankato and the City of North Mankato are unable to agree on the calibration of the metering device or related equipment, an impartial registered professional engineer, mutually satisfactory to the parties shall be selected as an arbitrator to supervise any repairs and calibration of the metering device or other related equipment. If the parties hereto cannot agree on the selection of a registered professional engineer to act as an arbitrator, a District Court judge for Blue Earth County shall select the qualified professional engineer to act as arbitrator. The findings of the selected arbitrator shall be final and binding on the parties. The services of the arbitrator shall be paid one-half by each party hereto. Any decision of the arbitrator shall be in accordance with the terms, covenants, conditions and provisions of this Agreement.
- K. If any required flow metering or sampling equipment, which is the responsibility of the City of North Mankato is non-functional for five (5) business days, temporary equipment approved by the City of Mankato shall be installed at the City of North Mankato's expense.
- L. If the required flow metering or sampling equipment fails, the wastewater volume and pollutant loadings shall be estimated using the most comparable recent historical data. Said estimates shall continue until such time as the equipment is repaired or replacement equipment is installed as required by this Agreement.

# VIII. SANITARY SEWER BYPASS EVENTS

- A. Bypasses within the City of North Mankato's collection system may occur due to accidents such as pumps failing or pipes bursting or forced due to shut down of equipment for emergency repairs. Bypasses within the collection system may also occur, in order to keep sewage from backing up into homes, if there's no feasible way to reroute or contain the wastewater; heavy rains, snow melt or flooding.
- B. In the event of a bypass, the City of North Mankato shall immediately notify the Minnesota Duty Officer and the City of Mankato. When calling into the Duty Officer provide the NPDES Permit Number for the Mankato Wastewater Treatment Facility: **MN0030171.**

If further assistance is needed, call the customer service center at the MPCA in St. Paul at 1.800.657.3864. Assistance is also available from the Mankato MPCA office at 507.389.5977.

- C. Immediately following discovery of the release, the City of North Mankato shall collect representative samples and sample the release for parameters of concern. The City of North Mankato shall contact the MPCA to discuss the sampling parameters and protocol. In addition, Fecal Coliform Bacteria samples shall be collected. If the release cannot immediately be stopped, the City of North Mankato shall consult with the MPCA regarding additional sampling requirements.
- D. The MPCA Release Sampling Report, **Exhibit 4**, must be completed for each bypass event. The City of North Mankato shall; complete the first page of the MPCA Release Sampling Report which includes the estimated release start time and release discovery time, collect a sample of the bypass flow and provide a sample to the City of Mankato.
- E. The City of Mankato will complete required testing as identified on page 2 of the MPCA Release Sampling Report and as requested by the MPCA. The City of North Mankato shall reimburse the City of Mankato for all costs associated with testing.
- F. The City of Mankato will complete page two of the Release Sampling Report and submit the completed report to the MPCA with the monthly Discharge Monitoring Report (DMR) and provide a copy to the City of North Mankato.
- G. During the bypass event, the City of North Mankato shall keep the MPCA representative and the City of Mankato informed and take immediate action to discontinue the bypass as soon as possible.

# IX. <u>INSPECTION</u>

A. The City of Mankato Wastewater Superintendent or their designated representative, upon reasonable notice first given to the City of North Mankato, shall be permitted, at the expense of the City of Mankato, to inspect the design, materials, construction, as well as the subsequent operation and maintenance of the City of North Mankato system in order to confirm that the same is being constructed, operated and maintained according to applicable City of Mankato specifications, standards and

ordinances and all applicable Federal and State laws. The City of Mankato may inspect the City of North Mankato system under the above terms for the purpose of verifying that this Agreement is being complied with in its entirety.

- B. The City of North Mankato, upon reasonable notice first given to the City of Mankato, shall be permitted at the expense of the City of North Mankato, to inspect the condition and operation of the Mankato WWTP, in order to confirm that this Agreement is being complied with in its entirety.
- C. Upon written notice given by either party to this Agreement to the other that an investigation is necessary in the requesting party's opinion for the purpose of enforcing or complying with the provisions of this Agreement, the party being notified of the investigation shall, with all due diligence, assist in making such an investigation and shall make available to the requesting party, upon reasonable demand, all books, records and information maintained in connection with the operation and maintenance of its sanitary sewer system.

# X. QUALITY OF EFFLUENT, RESTRICTION OR SUSPENSION OF SERVICE

- A. The quality of raw wastewater to be delivered to the Mankato WWTP shall be aerobic in character and the odor shall not be stronger than that associated with "typical" municipal raw wastewater. If additional aeration or injection of chemicals is required in the judgment of the City of Mankato or the MPCA in order to prevent damage to the Mankato Treatment System or to eliminate nuisance odor conditions from the City of North Mankato force main, all costs associated with this shall be borne by the City of North Mankato.
- B. The strength of waste shall not exceed normal domestic strength as defined in the Chapter 3 of the Mankato City Code or the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES), whichever set of standards are identified to be more rigorous will be utilized.
- C. The discharge, accidental or intentional, of prohibited materials, as defined in Article X of this agreement and Chapter 3 of the Mankato City Code and the NPDES permit stanadards, is strictly prohibited.
- D. The cost of any damage to the Mankato Treatment System related to the discharge of sewage not conforming to the characteristics set forth in this agreement and Chapter 3 of the Mankato City Code and in the NPDES permit standards is the sole responsibility of the City of North Mankato liable for the illegal discharge.

- E. The City of North Mankato shall not intentionally dilute waste discharged into public sewers as a partial or complete substitute for pretreatment needed to achieve compliance with these rules or applicable federal and state pretreatment standards and requirements.
- F. The City of North Mankato shall immediately notify the City of Mankato of any potential, proposed or actual substantial change in the volume or strength characteristics of the wastewater effluent discharged at the point of interconnection with the Mankato Treatment System which the City of North Mankato knows or has reason to believe will or is likely to have, either singly or by interaction with other wastes, a negative impact on the Mankato Treatment System or which will exceed the parameters provided in Article VI or the materials prohibitions provided in Article X (Chapter 3 of the Mankato City Code). The City of Mankato, in its judgment, may restrict the rate of flow at the point of interconnection to strictly conform with the parameters established in Article VI and Article X of this Agreement.
- G. The City of Mankato may restrict or limit the rate of flow of wastewater discharges at the point of interconnection from the City of North Mankato System should the City of Mankato, in its judgment, determine that such restriction or limitation is necessary in order to stop an actual or threatened discharge which presents or may present an imminent or substantial endangerment to human health or welfare, an endangerment to the environment, interference with the operation of the Mankato Treatment System, or which may cause the City of Mankato to violate any condition of its NPDES permit.
- H. The City of North Mankato, when notified of a restriction or limitation on wastewater service as provided for in Paragraphs B or C of this Article, shall act as soon as practicable after notification to cease or reduce such discharges or take such actions as are necessary to cause those responsible users of the City of North Mankato system to cease or reduce such discharges. In the event or failure of a user of the City of North Mankato system to comply voluntarily with a restriction or limitation, the City of North Mankato shall take such actions as are necessary, including but not limited to, immediate suspension of sewer service or severance of the sewer connection, in order to ensure full compliance with all terms of this Agreement.
- I. Upon proof by a user of the City of North Mankato system who is under a City of North Mankato imposed restriction, limitation or suspension, of the elimination of the non-complying discharge, the City of North Mankato shall reinstate the pre-restriction sewer service to the user after notifying the City of Mankato thereof and after the City of Mankato verifies compliance and

approves in writing the removal of the restriction. Notification of approval by the City of Mankato to remove a restriction shall be provided to the City of North Mankato within thirty (30) days of such request by the City of North Mankato.

# XI. DISCHARGE OF CERTAIN MATERIALS PROHIBITED

- A. The City of North Mankato, by adoption of ordinances and employment of suitable methods, shall not discharge or allow any user of the City of North Mankato system to discharge, either directly or indirectly, any of the prohibited materials set forth in the Chapter 3 of the Mankato City Code or in the NPDES permit standards.
- B. If any waters or wastes are discharged or are proposed to be discharged to the Mankato Treatment System which contain substances or possess the characteristics enumerated in Paragraph A of this Article, and which, in the judgment of the City of Mankato, may have a deleterious effect upon the Mankato Treatment System, processes, or equipment; the receiving waters, soil, vegetation or groundwater; or which otherwise create a hazard to life or constitute a public nuisance, the City of Mankato may take one or all of the following actions:
  - 1. Reject the wastes prior to or during their discharge to the Mankato Treatment System;
  - 2. Require pretreatment to an acceptable condition for discharge to the public sewers, pursuant to Section 307 (b) of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act as amended;
  - 3. Require such remedial steps, as are in the judgment of the City of Mankato, necessary to abate any further impairment, either direct or indirect, of the proper functioning of the Mankato Treatment System;
  - 4. Require control over the quantities and rates of discharge which may include the restriction, limitation or suspension thereof;
  - 5. Require payment to cover the added costs of handling, treating and disposing of wastes not covered by existing user or sewer service charges. This includes, but is not limited to, reimbursement for any fines or penalties levied against the City of Mankato for a violation of its NPDES permit or which otherwise have resulted from a discharge from the City of North Mankato system; or

- 6. Require a wastewater discharge permit as contemplated in Paragraph C of this Article.
- C. The City of North Mankato agrees to require, by ordinance and employment of suitable methods, any user of the City of North Mankato system contemplating to discharge waters, wastes or loadings in excess of those described in Paragraph A of this Article, apply for and receive a written wastewater discharge permit between the user and the City of Mankato. No discharges or loadings as described in Paragraph A of this Article shall be permitted until an approved wastewater discharge permit has been issued to the user by the City of Mankato. The wastewater discharge permit shall at a minimum provide that:
  - 1. The user will pay all costs incurred by the City of Mankato arising out of the discharge including any fines and penalties;
  - 2. The user shall under no circumstances exceed the parameters established in Article VI;
  - 3. Provisions be made for constant monitoring of discharge as may be necessary in the judgment of the City of Mankato;
  - 4. The City of Mankato or the City of North Mankato may restrict, limit, suspend or shut-off the discharge before it enters the Mankato Treatment System;
  - 5. The wastewater discharge permit may be revoked or modified where necessary as the needs of the Mankato WWTP dictate, in the judgment of the City of Mankato, in connection with the demands placed on the facility, its capabilities, and emergencies affecting its operation in compliance with the applicable requirements for its operation by the City of Mankato;
  - 6. The City of North Mankato and the user shall hold the City of Mankato harmless for such discharge; and
  - 7. Such other terms as may be deemed appropriate to ensure the safe and verifiable granting of permission to place such excess discharges or loadings in the sanitary sewer system, including but not limited to, those permit requirements established in Mankato City Code, Section 3.31, as such requirements now exist or may from time to time be amended by the City Council of the City of Mankato. No wastewater discharge permit shall be granted hereunder where such discharge would violate applicable Federal or State laws or regulations or

adversely impact upon the City of Mankato's ability to comply with applicable terms of its NPDES permit or applicable regulations governing the Mankato WWTP.

# XII. INDUSTRIAL USERS, WASTEWATER DISHARGE PERMITS AND PRETREATMENT

- A. The City of North Mankato agrees to require, by ordinance and employment of suitable methods, that all industrial users of its system, adhere to and comply with the wastewater discharge permit, monitoring and pretreatment requirements established in Mankato City Code, Section 3.31, as such requirements now exist or may from time to time be amended by the City Council of the City of Mankato.
- B. The City of North Mankato agrees to require pretreatment to normal domestic strength levels prior to discharge to the City of North Mankato system of all wastewater discharges in excess of the normal domestic strength levels, as defined in Article II of this Agreement, and of any wastewater discharges which will contribute wastes enumerated under Article X, Paragraph A should the City of Mankato require such pretreatment.
- C. The City of North Mankato agrees to provide notice and to require any existing or future users of its system to provide notice to the City of Mankato of any new user connections to the City of North Mankato system; of any improvement, expansion or replacement of an existing user connection; any significant change in the strength of effluent from a user of its system; or of any expansion of the volume of discharges or loadings from a user of the City of North Mankato system. The City of North Mankato agrees to provide and require such notification prior to allowing any connection, construction or any additional discharges or loadings to its system. Upon such notice given by either the City of North Mankato or an existing or new user of the City of North Mankato system, the City of Mankato shall determine within thirty (30) days whether the user must apply for a wastewater discharge permit under Paragraph A of this Article or under Paragraph C of Article X. The City of Mankato shall notify the user in writing of its determination. The City of North Mankato shall require the user to provide the City of Mankato sufficient information for it to make this permit determination and the City of Mankato may require any additional information it deems necessary or desirable to make the permit determination. The City of Mankato may extend the permit determination period for an additional thirty (30) days should it deem such extension necessary or desirable.
- D. During the permit determination period, the City of North Mankato shall strictly prohibit any connection, construction or any additional discharges or

loadings by the user to the City of North Mankato system. If the City of Mankato determines that a wastewater discharge permit is required for a particular user of the City of North Mankato system, it shall so notify the user and the City of North Mankato thereof. Thereafter the City of North Mankato shall require that the user apply for and receive a wastewater discharge permit from the City of Mankato prior to any connection, construction or release of any additional discharges or loadings by the user to the City of North Mankato system.

- E. The City of Mankato shall have the right to measure and monitor the waste discharged by any industrial user or any user with a wastewater discharge permit at the point of discharge to the City of North Mankato system. All costs incurred by the City of Mankato in monitoring or measuring such waste shall be paid to the City of Mankato by the affected user.
- F. The City of North Mankato shall require that all industrial users having waste containing prohibited materials as provided for in this Agreement to construct pretreatment and monitoring facilities meeting the requirements of the City of Mankato as established in the City of Mankato Sanitary Sewer Ordinance, Section 3.31, as such requirements now exist or may from time to time be amended by the City Council of the City of Mankato. The City of Mankato agrees that in all events it will require the application of rules, regulations and standards with respect to any industrial user on an equitable basis notwithstanding the location thereof.
- G. If pretreatment is required, the design, construction, installation, operation and maintenance of the pretreatment facilities and equipment shall be made at the owners' (permitees') expense. The plans and specifications for such pretreatment facilities and their subsequent operation and maintenance shall be subject to the review, approval and inspection of the City of Mankato prior to any construction of such facilities. Any subsequent changes to the permitted pretreatment facilities or process which will potentially adversely affect the quality of the discharge or the method of operation shall be reported to and approved by the City of Mankato prior to constructing or initiating any changes.
- H. No person shall intentionally dilute industrial waste discharged into public sewers as a partial or complete substitute for pretreatment needed to achieve compliance with these rules or applicable federal and state pretreatment standards and requirements.
- I. The City of Mankato reserves the right to adopt, modify or amend standards and regulations governing the contribution of wastes, pretreatment and the

contents and applicability of wastewater discharge permits as the same from time to time may be necessary or desirable.

# XIII. INFILTRATION AND INFLOW

- A. The parties hereto agree that remediation of infiltration and inflow (I/I) is a priority for the serviced communities. Therefore, the purposes of controlling and remedying I/I, the City of North Mankato agrees, by adoption or ordinances and employment of suitable methods or such other actions as are necessary, to effectively exclude extraneous I/I to its sanitary sewer system, including but not limited to storm water runoff from roofs, eaves, rainspouts, yards, lawns, foundation drains, parking lots, streets, alleys and the like.
- B. The City of North Mankato agrees to adopt, comply with, adhere to and enforce an I/I inspection, monitoring, remediation and surcharge program which substantially meets the program established by the City of Mankato. As such requirements now exist and may from time to time be amended by the City of Mankato. In no event shall the I/I program established by the City of North Mankato be less restrictive than the program set forth by the City of Mankato.
- C. The City of North Mankato shall exercise due care to preclude gravel, sand, dirt, grit or heavy substances of any kind from being washed or dumped into its sanitary sewer system. When expenses are incurred in cleaning the City of Mankato sewers due to any such substance being carried into them from the City of North Mankato system, all such expenses attributable to the City of North Mankato shall be paid for by the City of North Mankato within thirty (30) days of receipt of an invoice from the City of Mankato. The City of Mankato shall provide an itemized accounting of the cleaning expenses incurred with the invoice provided to the City of North Mankato.
- D. The City of North Mankato shall comply with the City of Mankato's I/I Manual for best practices and established flow limitations.

# XIV. AMOUNT OF FEES AND TIME OF PAYMENT

A. The parties hereto agree that in consideration for transport and treatment of the wastewater of the City of North Mankato by the City of Mankato, the City of North Mankato shall pay to the City of Mankato all fees and charges applicable thereto as provided for in this Agreement. The parties agree to apply the City of Mankato User Charge System (UCS) in establishing the applicable fees and charges. The parties agree that the Mankato UCS may be subject to adjustment from time to time during the term of this Agreement by the City Council of the City of Mankato.

- B. The parties agree that the sewer service charge assessed to the City of North Mankato by the City of Mankato shall include a user charge, a sewer service charge and a debt service charge for the costs attributable to treatment, as determined annually by the City of Mankato. Charges shall be proportionate to use in accordance with the Mankato UCS and the UCS may be amended from time to time to provide for additional charges or surcharges which in the judgment of the City of Mankato are necessary or desirable.
- C. The parties also agree that the sewer service charge assessed to the City of North Mankato by the City of Mankato also includes a collection system maintenance fee identified in the UCS. As specified in the Master Agreement.
- D. The City of Mankato shall, on an annual basis, prepare a budget for the wastewater utility and determine unit costs for the various treatment parameters. Based upon unit costs and an estimated wastewater contribution for the City of North Mankato, an annual cost of treatment shall be calculated for the City of North Mankato. This estimate of annual treatment costs shall be presented to the City of North Mankato at least sixty (60) days before the new rates are to be effective.
- E. The City of North Mankato shall pay, each month, one-twelfth (1/12) of the annual estimated treatment cost for the previous month's service. At the end of each fiscal year, a final billing or refund will be prepared by the City of Mankato based on the actual wastewater contribution by the City of North Mankato and the actual cost of operation and maintenance of the Mankato WWTP. The billing or refund shall reflect an interest rate of five percent (5%) per annum based on the average monthly under-or over-payment. The interest calculation shall be determined as follows:

(Actual Charges-Actual Payments) / 12 X 5% = Interest Due

If "Interest Due" is positive, payment is to the City of Mankato. If "Interest Due" is negative, payment is to the City of North Mankato.

- F. The City of North Mankato agrees to pay all applicable connection fees as determined by the City of Mankato. This includes the implemented sewer availability charge (SAC).
- G. City of North Mankato shall, submit Sewer Availability Charge (SAC) Permit Application and pay all applicable connection fees when the application for the sewer extension, as outline in **Exhibit 5 of this Agreement**, is submitted and prior to connection to the collection system.

- H. The SAC is a one-time fee for new connections or increased capacity demanded of the Mankato Wastewater Treatment Facility. One SAC unit equals 210 gallons of maximum potential daily wastewater flow capacity.
- I. Single family homes, townhouses, condominiums, duplex units, and apartments each equal one SAC per dwelling unit.
- J. For non-residential connections, one SAC unit is defined as 210 gallons of daily wastewater capacity. Communities pay a prorated SAC fee based on the estimated maximum potential daily wastewater flow capacity.
- K. The SAC revenue collected by the City of Mankato is used to finance the fixed costs; first offsetting annual capital maintenance; and then to reduce overall debt service payments. The remaining portion of the capital costs, representing currently used capacity, is paid by the communities through a portion of their monthly municipal charges. SAC pays for the wastewater infrastructure, making treatment available, while regular bills pay to treat the wastewater.
- L. Each SAC unit purchased by a community increases that communitie's allocated capacity by 210 gallons per day.

# XV. PENALTY FOR NON-PAYMENT

A. Failure on the part of the City of North Mankato to pay to the City of Mankato the payments specified above in Article XIII shall render such unpaid amount delinquent; and in the event such non-payment continues for a period of more than sixty (60) days after the due date, such delinquent amount shall bear interest at an annual rate of six percent (6%). The City of Mankato shall have and hereby reserves the right to enforce payment against the City of North Mankato by appropriate proceedings at law or in equity in any court of competent jurisdiction. All costs incurred by the City of Mankato in connection with collecting such delinquent accounts shall be paid by the City of North Mankato.

#### XVI. PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION OF WASTEWATER DISCHARGE PERMIT

A. The parties hereto agree that the City of Mankato may apply the following penalty assessment formula to users of the City of North Mankato system who violate the terms and conditions established in an approved City of Mankato wastewater discharge permit as provided for in Articles X and XI of this Agreement:

PENALTY = (Concentration (mg/L) of constituent<sup>1</sup> in excess of domestic strength<sup>2</sup>) \* (flow (MG)) \* 8.34\*(\$/lbs of constituent as established in User Charge System)

<sup>1</sup>Constituent refers to TSS, CBOD or any other constituent the City of Mankato deems necessary.

<sup>2</sup>Domestic strength as defined in the City of Mankato Code

- B. The parties agree that the penalty multiplier stated in the above formula will increase by 0.5 under the following circumstances:
  - 1. The problem caused by mechanical malfunction or human error was not corrected within 12 hours;
  - 2. The Mankato WWTP was not notified of the problem and the nature of the discharge, as soon as reasonably possible. (The Mankato Wastewater Superintendent determines reasonableness; appeal procedures are outlined in Section 3.31 of the Mankato City Code); or
  - 3. The user, in the judgment of the Mankato Wastewater Superintendent, has a history of mechanical malfunctions or human errors that effect wastewater discharge.
- C. The parties agree that the penalty multiplier stated in Paragraph A of this Article will be 5.0 in the event that increased loadings caused the Mankato WWTP to violate its NPDES permit.
- D. The parties agree that if the above penalties do not prove to be a deterrent for failing to meet permitted discharge limits, the penalties will be increased for the violating user to a level the City of Mankato deems necessary to achieve compliance with permit requirements.

### XVII. SURCHARGES

A. In the event that the City of North Mankato exceeds the discharge parameters set for in this Agreement, without first receiving prior written approval from the City of Mankato for such discharge, the City of Mankato, at its option, may restrict the rate of flow to meet the agreed upon parameters established in this Agreement, take any other actions as provided for in this Agreement, or charge the City of North Mankato a surcharge for those discharges of wastewater in excess of those defined in this Agreement. The excess rate of flow surcharge shall be calculated separately and shall be assessed for each hour that the agreed upon parameters were exceeded. Such additional charge for exceeding the allotted

limits is not intended to be a penalty, but rather, is an additional charge necessary to cover tangible and intangible operating and capital costs associated with accommodating the unexpected rate of flow or flow characteristics. For information regarding the exact cost of the surcharge, please consult the City of Mankato Code.

- B. In the event of extreme I/I events, as defined by this agreement and the I/I guidance manual, a surcharge will be assessed the City of North Mankato for the excess water to be treated. Such additional charge for excessive I/I is not intended to be a penalty, but rather, is an additional charge necessary to cover tangible and intangible operating and capital costs associated with accommodating the unexpected rate of flow from the City of North Mankato. For information regarding the exact cost of the surcharge, please consult the UCS.
- C. The City of Mankato, at its discretion, may choose to wave surcharges for situations in stated in Paragraph A or Paragraph B of this article in lieu of the City of North Mankato making a greater than or equal financial investment in the City of North Mankato Collection System to reduce the occurrence of such events.
- D. In addition to any surcharge, the City of North Mankato shall be liable for any damages caused to the Mankato Treatment System by such wastewater flows or loadings in excess of its allotted limits and will hold, save and defend the City of Mankato harmless from claims by third parties made as a result of the excess discharge and shall reimburse the City of Mankato for any and all additional costs over and above the surcharge for treating or otherwise disposing of the excess discharges.

### XVIII. CUSTOMER COMMUNITY TO ADOPT AND ENFORCE REGULATIONS

- A. The City of North Mankato shall enact, adopt and strictly enforce all such resolutions, ordinances or regulations as may be or shall be necessary to give full effect to the stipulations contained in this Agreement.
- B. The City of North Mankato agrees to adopt, enforce, comply with and adhere to all sewer use regulations and revisions thereto as established in Mankato City Code, Section 3.31, as such requirements now exist or may from time to time be amended by the City Council of the City of Mankato.

# XIX. THE CITY OF MANKATO TO ADOPT AND ENFORCE REGULATIONS

The City of Mankato shall enact, adopt and strictly enforce all such resolutions, ordinances or regulations, as may be or shall be necessary, in

the judgment of the City of Mankato, to give full effect to the stipulations contained in this Agreement.

#### XX. CUSTOMER COMMUNITY REPORTS AND MEETINGS

- A. The City of Mankato will hold a meeting in April of each year with the customer communities to review and answer questions related to the previous year's final settlement for wastewater charges.
- B. The City of Mankato will provide an Annual Financial Report that summarizes the overall financial operation of the Mankato Treatment System. The purpose of the report is to assist the City of North Mankato in planning for capital budget expenditures, anticipated major repairs and review the budget to actual expenditures and revenues for the prior year. The City and the customer communities will work cooperatively to ensure a clear and transparent financial reporting process. The Annual Financial Report may include the following:
  - 1. Sewer Fund Financial Statement with summary of the prior year's budgeted and actual expenditures, the amount paid by each community, related funds (debt service and Sewer Access Charge) and line item descriptions that make up statement.
  - 2. Summary of the proposed Capital Improvement Plan.
  - 3. When flows and/or loadings reach 85% of the wastewater treatment facility's permitted capacity, the City of Mankato will provide a review of the number of Residential Equivalent Units (REUs) available.
  - 4. Table VI of Article VI, identifying the allocated capacity, annually adjusted, will be provided. The allocated capacity is the average of the Average Wet Weather (AWW) flow data available from the previous ten years and includes a standard deviation of 1 to account for infill and fluctuation in flows.
  - 5. Review of User Charge System and calculations. Summary table of User Charge System is attachment, refer to Exhibit A-1.
  - 6. Review Sewer Utility Assets and Depreciation Schedule. The 2013 sewer utility depreciation schedule is attached. The schedule will be annually updated and provided at the annual meeting.

- C. At a minimum the City of Mankato will hold a meeting in July of each year with the customer communities. Additional meetings may be held at the request of customer communities or as deemed necessary by the City of Mankato. A representative and elected official from the City of North Mankato are encouraged to attend meetings. The following items may be discussed at the annual meeting:
  - 1. Review Annual Financial Report
  - 2. Review the projected 5 year Capital Improvement Plan (CIP)
  - 3. Changes to the City of Mankato's Wastewater Treatment Facility's Master Plan
  - 4. Review potential permit changes/new regulations and impact on WWTF
  - 5. Review Inflow/Infiltration status for each Customer Community
  - 6. Review available capacity (hydraulic and loadings) at the WWTF
  - 7. When flows and/or loadings reach 85% of the wastewater treatment facility's permitted capacity, the City of Mankato will provide a review of the number of Residential Equivalent Units (REUs) available.

#### XXI. COOPERATION AND PARTICIPATION WITH AGENCIES

The City of North Mankato shall cooperate and participate with the City of Mankato in providing all data requested by any State or Federal agency relative to regulatory policies or funding requests.

#### XXII. LIABILITY FOR NEGLIGENCE

The City of North Mankato shall indemnify, save and hold harmless the City of Mankato from any and all loss or damage to any property incurred by the City of Mankato by reason of any act or omission of the City of North Mankato, its agents or employees, in connection with the construction or operation and maintenance of the sanitary sewer system belonging to the City of North Mankato, unless the same shall be due to the negligence of the City of Mankato, its agents or employees. The City of Mankato shall indemnify, save and hold harmless the City of North Mankato from any and all loss or damage to any property incurred by the City of North Mankato by

reason of any act or omission on the part of the City of Mankato, its agents or employees, in connection with the construction or operation and maintenance of the City of Mankato sanitary sewer system and Treatment System, unless the same shall be due to the negligence of the City of North Mankato, its agents or employees.

# XXIII. NON-LIABILITY OF THE CITY OF MANKATO UNDER CERTAIN CHANGED CIRCUMSTANCES

The City of Mankato shall exercise diligence in operating its sanitary sewer system, and if said system is prevented from receiving and discharging sewage from the City of North Mankato in accordance with the terms of this Agreement by any cause not reasonably within the control of the City of Mankato, including but not limited to acts of God (fire, explosion, flood, earthquake, tornado), strike, war, unavoidable accident, rupture pipe resulting from temperature change or ground disturbances, or Federal or State interference (governmental exercise of authority, court orders), the City of Mankato agrees (except in the case of total destruction or near total destruction of its properties) to diligently put its works in condition again, as soon as practicable, to dispose of sewage in the manner provided for in this Agreement. The City of North Mankato shall hold, save and defend the City of Mankato harmless for any damage or loss resulting from such impossibility, frustration, interruption or suspension of performance of the terms of this Agreement.

#### XXIV. TITLE TO REMAIN WITH THE CITY OF MANKATO

It is agreed and understood by the parties hereto that the title to, and all incidents of ownership in, the Mankato Treatment System, any subsequent replacement or upgrades, improvements or expansions thereof, and all the grounds upon which the same is located shall remain in the City of Mankato and shall be the absolute property of said City of Mankato. It is further agreed and understood that the operation of the Mankato Treatment System and employment of personnel therefore shall be in the full charge of the City of Mankato.

#### XXV. TERM OF AGREEMENT

This Agreement shall take effect as of the date first written above and shall continue in force for the duration of the NPDES permit of the WWTP. The current WWTP's NPDES permit is valid until August 31, 2015. In the event that NPDES permit is modified prior to that, the City of Mankato reserves the right to modify this City of North Mankato agreement. In the event that the

current NPDES permit is extended past August 31, 2015, this agreement will be extended until the new expiration date.

The city of Mankato will inform all customer communities of any foreseeable NPDES permit modifications or extensions at a minimum of 30 days prior to the expiration date of the permit.

#### XXVI. DEFAULT

- A. The City of Mankato may declare a default under this Agreement for any of the following reasons:
  - 1. Failure to factually report rate of flows and loadings;
  - 2. Failure to report significant changes in rate of flows and loadings;
  - 3. Refusing reasonable access for purposes of investigation, inspection or monitoring; or
  - 4. Violating or breaching any other term or condition of this Agreement.
- B. Whenever the City of Mankato finds conduct which constitutes a default under the terms of Paragraph A of this Article, the City of Mankato shall serve or cause to be served upon the City of North Mankato a written notice by certified mail, stating the nature of the alleged default. Within thirty (30) days of the date of receipt of the notice, the City of North Mankato shall respond in writing to the City of Mankato, advising of its position with respect to the allegations. The City of Mankato may require representatives of the City of North Mankato to meet three (3) times with representatives of the City of Mankato at a location chosen by the City of Mankato in order to ascertain the accuracy of the allegations and where necessary, establish a plan for the satisfactory correction thereof.
- C. In the event of any continuing default on the part of either party hereto, the aggrieved party, after first giving reasonable written notice and affording a reasonable opportunity to correct such default, may, at the non-defaulting party's option, submit said grievance to binding arbitration; or the non-defaulting party, may, at its option, institute any other action or proceedings as provided for herein, or available at law or in equity, as may be considered by it upon advice of legal counsel to be most effective for the enforcement of this Agreement.
- D. In addition to the remedies provided for in this Agreement and any other available remedies at law or in equity, in the case of a default, the non-

defaulting party may bring an action for specific performance to compel the performance of this Agreement in accordance with its terms.

#### XXVII. <u>DISPUTES</u>

- A. Negotiation. When a disagreement or dispute shall arise over interpretation of any provision of this Agreement and such dispute does not constitute an event of default under Article XXIV, the City of Mankato and the City of North Mankato will direct staff members as they deem appropriate to meet at a mutually convenient time and place to attempt to resolve the disagreement or dispute through negotiation.
- B. Arbitration/Adjudication. When the parties to this Agreement are unable to resolve a disagreement or dispute over interpretation of any provision of this Agreement through negotiation, either party may seek relief by submitting a grievance to binding arbitration or through initiation of an action in a court of competent jurisdiction.

#### XXVIII. RELATIONSHIP OF THE PARTIES

No party to this Agreement shall by virtue of this Agreement have any responsibility with respect to services provided or contractual obligations assumed by any other party, and nothing in this Agreement shall be deemed to constitute or to create any fiduciary or agency relationship among the parties or any other party.

#### XXIX. GOVERNING LAW

This Agreement is made pursuant to, and shall be construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Minnesota.

#### XXX. ATTACHMENTS

All Attachments or Exhibits referred to in this Agreement are hereby made a part hereof and incorporated herein by reference as fully and as completely as if set forth herein verbatim.

#### XXXI. WAIVER

The waiver by either party of an event of default of any term of this Agreement by the non-defaulting party shall not operate, or be construed to operate, as a waiver of any subsequent claim of default or any other claim available under this Agreement or available at law or in equity. The making or the acceptance of a payment by either party with knowledge of the

existence of a default shall not operate, or be construed to operate, as a waiver of any subsequent claim of default or any other claim available under this Agreement or available at law or in equity.

#### XXXII. ENTIRE AGREEMENT

The terms, covenants, conditions and provisions of this Agreement, including present and all future attachments or exhibits shall constitute the entire agreement between the parties hereto superseding all prior agreements and negotiations. This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the respective successors and assigns of the City of Mankato and the City of North Mankato.

#### XXXIII. AMENDMENT

This Agreement may be amended or modified only by mutual, written agreement duly executed by both of the parties hereto. Such written agreement shall be executed by a resolution duly adopted by the City Council of the City of North Mankato and the City Council of the City of Mankato.

#### XXXIV. SEVERABILITY

In the event that any provision of this Agreement is determined to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, by reason of any existing or subsequently enacted legislation, or by the application of existing or subsequently adopted rules and regulations of any State or Federal agency, the other provisions of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect, and the parties hereto shall negotiate in good faith and agree to such amendments or modifications of or to this Agreement or other appropriate actions as shall, to the maximum extent practicable in light of such determination, implement and give effect to the intentions of the parties hereto.

#### XXXV. CAPTIONS AND HEADINGS

Captions and headings in this Agreement are for ease of reference only and are not intended to alter the terms of this Agreement.

#### XXXVI. NOTICE

Any notices required under the provisions of this Agreement shall be in writing and sufficiently given if delivered in person or sent by certified or registered mail, return receipt requested, postage prepaid, as follows:
