### **COUNCIL MINUTES June 15, 2015**

Pursuant to due call and notice thereof, a regular meeting of the North Mankato City Council was held in the Municipal Building Council Chambers on June 15, 2015. Mayor Dehen called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. asking that everyone join in the Pledge of Allegiance. The following were present for roll call: Mayor Dehen, Council Members Spears, Steiner, Norland and Freyberg, City Administrator Harrenstein, Finance Director Thorne, Attorney Kennedy, City Clerk Van Genderen, City Planner Fischer and Public Works Director Swanson.

#### Approval of Agenda

Council Member Norland moved, seconded by Council Member Steiner, to approve the agenda as presented. Vote on the motion: Spears, Steiner, Norland, Freyberg and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

#### **Approval of Minutes**

Council Member Norland moved, seconded by Council Member Steiner to approve the minutes of the Council meeting of June 1, 2015. Vote on the motion: Steiner, Norland, Freyberg and Dehen aye; Spears abstain. Motion carried.

#### **Public Comments**

Barry Hager, CenterPoint Energy, appeared before the Council and presented Sandra Howe from the North Mankato Police Department a check for \$1,500.00 to help purchase training safety mats.

Barb Church, 102 East Wheeler Avenue, appeared before the Council and requested the City of North Mankato consider working with Zero Waste's Organics Recycling Project. Mayor Dehen requested the City place contact information in the City's E-newsletter.

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#### **Business Items**

### Consider Accepting the 2014 Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR).

Kyle Meyers from Abdo, Eick & Meyers appeared before the Council to present the Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) for the year ended December 31, 2014. Mr. Meyers gave a PowerPoint presentation recapping the year's activities and reported an unmodified or "clean" audit. He reported the City received the GFOA Certificate for 2014 for the 27th year. GASB 61, the Port Authority Component Unit, is now blended in with other City funds for the 2014 report. Mr. Meyers reviewed the General Fund balance, 2014 General fund operations, General Fund revenue by source, General Fund expenditures by program, Special Revenue funds, Debt Service funds and Capital Projects funds. Mr. Meyers also reviewed the Enterprise Funds cash flows for water utility, sewer utility, sanitary collection, storm water and solid waste fund. He presented a ratio analysis of the City's peer group for debt to assets, debt service coverage, debt per capita, taxes per capita, current expenditures per capita, capital expenditures per capita, capital assets % left to depreciate for government and business-type, and reported the City is in line with the peer group. Mr. Meyers commended the City Administrator and Finance Director for their work preparing for the CAFR. Council Member Freyberg indicated the annual debt service requirements for the next 10 years only shows what would happen to the debt service fund if the City did not acquire additional debt. Council Member Spears requested information on how the City plans to restore the storm water and sanitary collection fund. Administrator Harrenstein indicated that with the new contract with West Central Sanitation the City would see what the sanitary collection fund looks like at the end of the year. Administrator Harrenstein stated the storm water fund is used to replace curb and gutter, upgrade electrical for the pumping stations and funds one staff member. Harrenstein noted that the Strategic Plan specifically reviews the storm water fee and will be addressed this year. Council Member Freyberg indicated that page 9 of the Management Letter shows the Local Option Sales Tax as reduced in 2014. Mr. Meyers indicated the City transferred out more than it received. Council Member Freyberg stated he would like to see the City implement a funding formula for each year to allow the City to have consistency with how much it spends. Council Member Norland moved, seconded by Council Member Steiner to accept the 2014 Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR). Vote on the motion: Spears, Steiner, Norland, Freyberg and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

#### V-1-15, Variance Request to Increase the Maximum Height of a Fence in a Front Yard Setback from 3 feet to 5 feet, a Request from Kerry and Jennifer Walls.

City Planner Fischer indicated the Planning Commission originally reviewed the request on May 14, 2015. The Planning Commission tabled the request for three reasons: 1) Review of the request by the Traffic & Safety Committee. 2) Allow the applicant to request a specific fence height. 3) Send notification to area residents should the height of the fence change. The Traffic & Safety Committee reviewed the plan on May 21, 2015 and recommended approval of the five foot high wrought iron fence in a specific location. The Planning Commission met on June 11, 2015 and reviewed the applicable test to qualify for a reasonable modification of a zoning ordinance under the American's with Disability Act (ADA). The Planning Commission believed the variance request met the criteria for such modifications. The Planning Commission recommends the variance as long as the property is occupied by the applicant because the modification is to benefit a child with a disability. Council Member Freyberg requested clarification on how the variance would be recorded. City Planner Fischer indicated the variance would be recorded with the County of Nicollet. **Council Member Norland moved, seconded by Council Member Steiner to approve V-1-15, Variance Request to Increase the Maximum Height of a Fence in a Front Yard Setback from 3 feet to 5 feet. Vote on the motion: Spears, Steiner, Norland, Freyberg, and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.** 

#### **COUNCIL MINUTES June 15, 2015**

#### City Administrator and Staff Comments

Administrator Harrenstein congratulated Library Director Lucy Lowry on nearly doubling the attendance from last year at Bookin' on Belgrade nearly 5K family fun run.

Administrator Harrenstein congratulated Public Works Director Swanson on a successful Movie in the Park, with nearly 1,000 people in attendance.

Public Works Director Swanson thanked the Fire Department, the Police Department and the North Mankato Taylor Library for helping to make Movie in the Park successful.

### **Mayor and Council Comments**

Council Member Steiner stated he was contacted by a resident concerning boulevard trees on the north side of Belgrade that were impeding walkers on the sidewalk. Public Works Director Swanson stated the Parks Department would address the issue.

Council Member Steiner reported concerns about bicyclists not using the biking lanes correctly and impeding traffic during rush hour. Mayor Dehen indicated he would contact bicyclist groups to try and eliminate the problem.

Council Member Norland requested a flier for Zero Waste Organics be included in the utility bill. Administrator Harrenstein stated the City would need to see it first before a flier could be included in the utility bill.

Mayor Dehen thanked the Police and the City for working with the Elks on the Flag Day Celebration held at Centennial Park on June 14, 2015.

#### **Public Comments**

<u>Mike Kennedy, City Attorney</u>, stated his grandson is working on becoming an Eagle Scout and is collecting books on behalf of the Ronald McDonald House. Attorney Kennedy stated books could be dropped off at the Dork Den at 603 North Riverfront Drive, Mankato or at the offices of Kennedy and Kennedy at 99 Navajo Avenue, Mankato.

There being no further business, on a motion by Council Member Steiner, seconded by Council Member Norland, the meeting adjourned at 7:55 p.m.

(B) *Intoxicating liquor, on-sale*. No sale of intoxicating liquor at on-sale may be made at the following times:

(1) Between 2:00 a.m. and 8:00 a.m. on the days of Monday through SaturdaySunday;

#### (2) After 2:00 a.m. on Sundays;

(23) Between 8:00 p.m. on December 24 and 8:00 a.m. on December 25.

(C) *Sunday liquor sales*. A licensee possessing an on-sale intoxicating liquor license as well as a Sunday liquor license shall make no sales of alcoholic beverages at the following times:

(1) Between 2:00 a.m. and 8:00 a.m. on the days of Monday through Saturday Sunday;

(2) Between 2:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. on Sundays;

(32) Between 8:00 p.m. on December 24 and 2:00 a.m. on December 25; unless December 24 is a Sunday, in which case the Sunday sales schedule shall apply;

( $\underline{3}4$ ) Between 2:00 a.m. and 8:00 a.m. on December 25, <u>unless December 25 is a Sunday</u>, in which case the Sunday sales schedule shall apply.

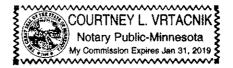

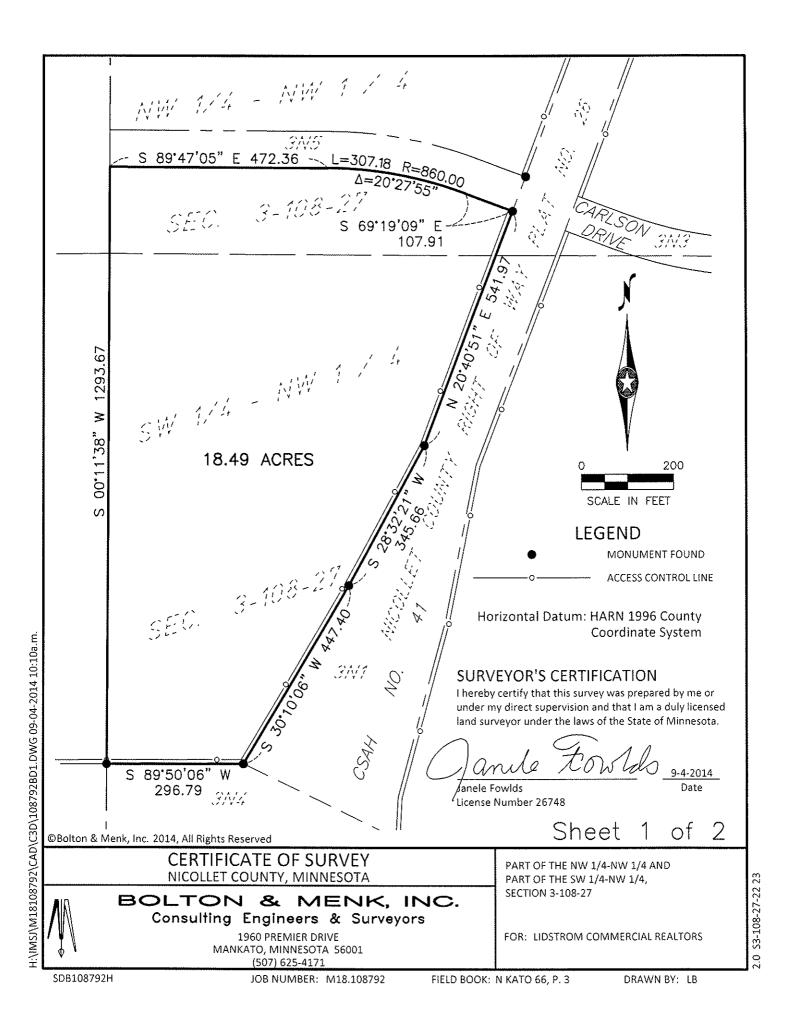

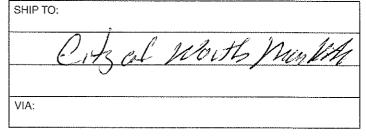

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of North Mankato is desirous of establishing and adopting a written policy relating to code enforcement in order to provide direction to both residents and staff for the fair and equitable enforcement of the City of North Mankato Municipal Code, the Zoning Ordinance, and other regulatory codes adopted by the City of North Mankato;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NORTH MANKATO, MINNESOTA, as follows:

- 1) The attached enforcement policy has been instituted to provide a fair and reasonable method for obtaining compliance with City Code.
- 2) The Code Enforcement Policy will be reviewed as needed.

## **CODE ENFORCEMENT POLICY**

### **INTRODUCTION**

The Code Enforcement Policy, approved by the City of North Mankato City Council, provides guidelines for the enforcement of the City of North Mankato Municipal Code, the Zoning Ordinance, and other regulatory codes adopted by the City of North Mankato. This document is intended to regulate only those enforcement/compliance processes, and activities, initiated by the City of North Mankato.

## I. CODE ENFORCEMENT PROGRAM

Minnesota Statutes gives the City Council of the City of North Mankato the "power to provide for the government and good order of the City, the suppression of vice and immortality, the prevention of crime, the protection of public and private property, the benefit of residence, trade, and commerce, and the promotion of health, safety, order and convenience, and the general welfare as it shall deem expedient."

## A. STANDARD ENFORCEMENT POLICY

The City of North Mankato residents are supported in their efforts to maintain the physical environment of their neighborhoods through standards set in local ordinances. To assist in this endeavor, the following code enforcement policy has been established to guide the City in addressing properties with code violations.

This policy is a guideline and does not bind the City. The City may deviate from this policy at any time if at the sole discretion of the City, as deviation is deemed appropriate.

**Typical Violations** 

- Junk Storage
- Permit Violations
- Garbage and Refuse
- Tall Grass
- Signage
- Yard Parking

- Right-of-Way
- Animals
- Junk Vehicles
- Zoning Use
- Property Maintenance
- Property Nuisance

## **B. COMPLAINT PRIORITY CLASSIFICATIONS**

City staff inspects every complaint it receives. When a violation is confirmed, the appropriate action is taken. Due to staff and time constraints, it is sometimes necessary to prioritize complaints and violations. When this happens, complaints are prioritized as follows:

- 1. Immediate risk to public health and safety.
- 2. High risk to health and safety through potential environmental impacts.
- 3. Work begun or actions taken without the necessary permits.
- 4. Aesthetic and nuisance violations.

### II. **DEFINITIONS**

Abatement-Abatements are the removal or repair of a substandard property conditions by the property owner, agent, or City.

City Code-The City Code includes all ordinances passed by the City including those that have not been codified.

Code Enforcement Officer- The term Code Enforcement Officer includes all City employees authorized to issue citations.

Compliance Deadline- The Compliance Deadline (re-inspection date) is the date compliance is required and listed on the Notice of Violation, or Notice and Order. If compliance has not occurred by the compliance deadline a misdemeanor citation may be issued, or an abatement process may be initiated. The Compliance Deadline may be extended at the discretion of the Code Enforcement Officer.

Compliance Inspection- The Compliance Inspection is the re-inspection of the property on or after the date which is established when a notice is issued.

Extension- An extension provides additional time for a responsible party to fully remedy any identified code violations. When a legitimate need arises a responsible party may request an extension beyond the initial compliance deadline. Extensions are determined at the sole discretion of the Code Enforcement Officer or other City official handling the matter.

Life Safety Hazard- A Life Safety Hazard is any identified code violation that has the potential to directly, or indirectly, cause bodily harm. Examples of life safety hazards include, but are not limited to: vehicles dangerously positioned on jacks, concrete

blocks, wood, or other physical objects; certain types of right-of-way obstructions; dead trees or trees leaning at precarious angles; missing or obscured building addresses; swimming pools which are not properly fenced or secured; broken windows; electric hazards; unsecured structures; and any other hazardous conditions where there exists a foreseeable danger to the public. Note: all life safety hazards will be described as such on all written notices.

Notice of Violation- A Notice of Violation is a standard formal legal notification (written notice) issued by a Code Enforcement Officer advising the responsible party that a violation(s) exists on their property. It also establishes a compliance deadline. This written notice is principally designed to encourage timely voluntary compliance.

Repeat/Recurring Violation- A Repeat/Recurring Violation is a newly identified code violation on a property involving the same responsible party for the same or substantially the same violation as identified on a previous investigation within the last twelve (12) months. Note the twelve (12) months is calculated from the date of the Initial Property Inspection to the date of the Initial Property inspection of the new violation.

**Responsible Party** 

- 1. The listed owner(s) in the Nicollet County real property information record.
- 2. All tenants on the property.
- 3. Any person or entity creating a violation even if they are not the record owner or tenant. For limited liability companies, corporations, or other forms of businesses and corporations, the responsible parties are the principals and officers of the entity.

Voluntary Compliance- Voluntary Compliance is achieved when all identified code violations are corrected before the established compliance deadline. This allows the Code Enforcement Officer to pass the inspection without the issuance of a citation, or the initiation of an abatement process. Voluntary Compliance is considered the preferred method of resolving code violations.

## III. REACTIVE/PROACTIVE ENFORCEMENT

## A. REACTIVE (COMPLAINT BASED) ENFORCEMENT

The City of North Mankato City Code, including but not limited to the Zoning Ordinance, and other regulatory codes adopted by the City are principally enforced on a complaint basis. This is designed to encourage a resident, neighborhood associations, block watch programs, or other City departments to actively participate in the enforcement/compliance process.

### **B. PROACTIVE ENFORCEMENT**

The City may observe and respond to code violations during regular business, visit areas for reactive enforcement, or proactive code enforcement sweeps.

### IV. GENERAL PROCEDURES

### A. LIFE SAFETY COMPLAINTS

If the alleged violation concerns a potential health of safety hazard to the neighborhood or neighbors, inclusive of open/vacant buildings, fire hazard and/or health hazards, or other health and safety hazards, the City's goal will be to respond within one (1) business day of receiving the complaint.

#### **B. NON-LIFE SAFETY COMPLAINTS.**

If the alleged violation is not a potential health or safety hazard the City's goal will be to respond within five (5) business days of receiving the complaint.

### C. NOTICE OF VIOLATION/NOTICE AND ORDER

Upon the initial property inspection the responsible party will be notified of any violation(s) discovered during the inspection process through the issuance of a written notice. If the responsible party is not present to receive the written notice at the time of the initial property inspection, the notice will be posted on the property in a conspicuous location and may be mailed. The notice of violation will specify a compliance deadline. The notice of violation will also list any observed code violation(s).

### D. FINAL NOTICE OF VIOLATION-CITATION/ABATEMENT FOR NON-COMPLIANCE

Unless a violation is an immediate enforcement violation, any uncorrected code violations remaining after the Compliance Deadline will receive a final notice of violation. After the final notice compliance deadline, remaining violations are subject to citation and/or the initiation of abatement. In addition, a final notice will also provide an explanation that repeat/recurring code violations, on the same property, within twelve (12) months are subject to expedited legal action.

## V. REPEAT/RECURRING VIOLATIONS

The Repeat/Recurring Violation process is designed to provide resolution through a procedural fast track. The discovery of a repeat offense is cause to:

1. Issue a repeat/recurring violation warning notice.

The Repeat Recurring Violation Warning Notice will be a final notice of violation that will be mailed directly to the responsible party(s), via U.S. Mail, to the address as listed on the Nicollet County Assessor Record. This written notice will advise the responsible party that repeat/recurring violations may be present on their property. Educational material describing other common code violations may be including with the warning notice. As specified in the final notice of violation, a compliance inspection will be made. At the time of this compliance inspection, any unresolved repeat/recurring violations are cause to:

- 2. Issue a citation;
- 3. Initiate an abatement process

## VI. IMMEDIATE ENFORCEMENT VIOLATIONS

Certain types of illegal activities constitute an imminent public safety and health hazard. The following types of illegal activities may result in the issuance of a citation without the benefit of receiving a written notice:

- 5. Person(s) found responsible for causing an obstruction of a public street, or sidewalk.
- 6. Other violations as determined by the City.

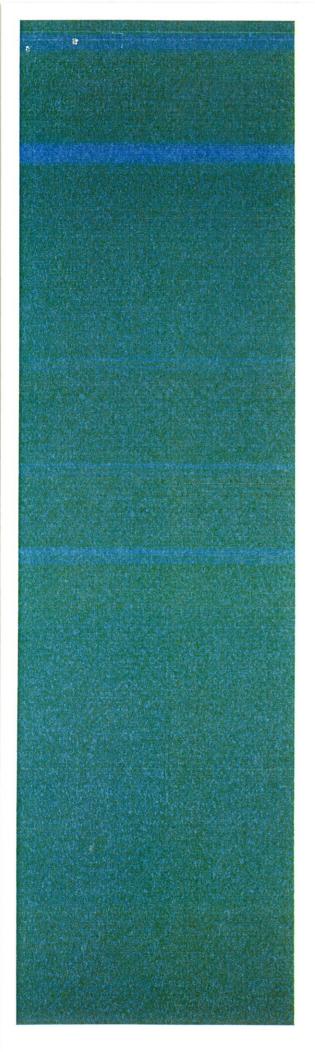

### **PROJECT INTRODUCTION**

This Preliminary Engineering Report considers new street and utility construction on West Carlson Drive from County State Aid Highway (CSAH 41) to approximately 850-feet west of CSAH 41. This project is the westerly extension of the segment of Carlson Drive between CSAH 41 and Lookout Drive that was constructed in 2010 and 2011. The proposed street and utility extension is being contemplated in response to a proposed development to be located south of the Carlson Drive extension and west of CSAH. The project location is shown on the vicinity map, Figure No. 1 of Appendix A.

In accordance with Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 429, the City Council has authorized the preparation of a preliminary engineering report to define the scope and determine the feasibility of the proposed project. The specific objectives of this Preliminary Engineering Report are to:

- 1. Evaluate the need for the project.
- 2. Determine the necessary improvements.
- 3. Provide information on the estimated costs for the proposed project.
- 4. Determine the project schedule.
- 5. Determine the feasibility of the proposed project.

The project as proposed would consist of extending West Carlson Drive approximately 850-feet west of CSAH 41. Specific items of construction will include:

- 1. Construction of sanitary sewer.
- 2. Construction of watermain.
- 3. Construction of storm sewer.
- 4. Installation of bituminous pavement with concrete curb and gutter.
- 5. Installation of concrete sidewalk and bituminous trail.

### **EXISTING CONDITIONS**

#### Land Use

The existing land use in the areas adjacent to the proposed project consists of agricultural land. The areas immediately north and south of the proposed Carlson Drive extension are designated for General Commercial land use in the City's Comprehensive Plan. The area to the west of the proposed Carlson Drive extension is designated for Commercial/Industrial Mixed Use. The street right-of-way for Carlson Drive west of CSAH 41 was platted in 2010 with the CSAH 41 Right-of-Way plat and is 80-feet wide.



The existing parcels located to the north and to the south of the proposed Carlson Drive extension are currently outside of the City limits. The City has been in discussions with a party that intends to develop the parcel extending from the Carlson Drive extension south the Trunk Highway 14. This property will be annexed into the City and zoned B-3, General Commercial. It is anticipated that the property north of Carlson Drive will not be annexed at this time.

The location of the proposed project is shown on Figure No. 1 in Appendix A. Street

In anticipation of the future street extension, a 44-wide street section with curb and gutter and utilities was stubbed approximately 20-feet west of CSAH 41 with the CSAH 41/Carlson Drive/Howard Drive construction project in 2011. Along with the 2011 project, an 8-foot concrete walk was constructed to the southwest corner of CSAH 41 and West Carlson Drive.

#### Storm Sewer, Sanitary Sewer and Watermain

Storm sewer, sanitary sewer, and watermain was stubbed west from CSAH 41 with the CSAH 41/Carlson Drive/Howard Drive construction project in 2011 to serve future development. The storm sewer stub consists of a 24-inch reinforced concrete pipe (RCP). The 24-inch storm sewer drains north to an existing storm sewer under CSAH 41 where it discharges into the basin at the southwest corner of CSAH 41 and CSAH 6. The sanitary sewer stub is an 18-inch polyvinyl chloride (PVC) pipe appropriately sized to serve future development west of CSAH 41. The pipe is approximately 16-feet deep at CSAH 41. All wastewater collected by this pipe drains east on Carlson Drive. A 16-inch watermain was stubbed to the west of CSAH 41.

#### **PROPOSED IMPROVEMENTS**

#### Street

Carlson Drive is proposed to be extended west of CSAH 41 a distance of approximately 850feet. The roadway is proposed to be a 44-foot wide bituminous street with concrete curb and gutter on both sides, an 8-foot concrete sidewalk on the north side and an 8-foot bituminous trail on the south side. The width of the roadway will allow for two 12-foot wide travel lanes, 2-foot curb reaction distance on each side and a shared 16-foot center turn lane.

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The City's "typical" bituminous pavement section for commercial/industrial streets will be utilized: 7 inches of bituminous surfacing, 11 inches of Class 5 aggregate base, and 6 inches of crushed rock base, all placed on a prepared subgrade. Since the new street alignment will extend through the lower portion in the topography, it is anticipated that fill material will be required to bring the street to the proposed grade. The soils in this area of the City are expected to be generally clay in nature and should provide a good sub-base for roadway construction. However, if unsuitable subsoils are discovered during construction, engineered fill may be required.

The construction of 6-inch diameter perforated edge drains along the back of the curb on both sides is proposed to provide subsurface drainage for the pavement section. The edge drains will help to remove moisture from the subgrade thus strengthening the subgrade and reducing the chances of damage from saturated subgrades.

Entrance curb cuts and driveways will be constructed where the locations of new driveways are known. Upon completion of surface improvements, boulevards will be restored with topsoil and seed in all disturbed areas.

The proposed street and surface improvements and the proposed typical section for West Carlson Drive are shown on Figure No. 2 in Appendix A.

#### Storm Sewer

The proposed storm sewer improvements consist of extending new storm sewer pipe westerly from the existing storm sewer stub at CSAH 41. The mainline storm sewer piping will range from 18 inches to 24 inches in diameter. The pipe will be adequately sized to handle the 10-year rainfall event the proposed street extension and adjacent areas and will be oversized to handle storm water from the future westerly extension of the roadway. Manholes will be located at appropriate intervals to provide catch basin connections and access for maintenance and cleaning.

New catch basins are proposed at intervals that allow the structures to adequately drain the roadway for the 10-year rainfall event. Dual catch basins are proposed on both sides of West Carlson Drive approximately 600-feet west of CSAH 41in order to provide adequate inlet Prepared by: Bolton & Menk, Inc. – M18.109337 Preliminary Engineering Report Page 3 City Project No. 15-ABCDEF April 2015



capacity at this roadway low point. Additional catch basins are proposed at intermediate points between the high points and low points in the street. Catch basins will also provide an outlet for the water collected in the 6-inch edge drainage pipe along each side of the roadway.

The proposed storm sewer construction is shown on Figure No. 2 in Appendix A.

### Sanitary Sewer

The extension of an 18-inch diameter sanitary sewer along the entire length of the West Carlson Drive extension is proposed. The proposed sanitary sewer will provide sewer service to the adjacent properties. The proposed 18-inch sanitary sewer is upsized from the typical 8-inch sanitary sewer main in order to provide capacity for future development to the west. The new pipe will be made of PVC with a rubber-gasketed and precast concrete manholes, also with rubber-gasketed joints, will be provided at intervals not exceeding 400 feet to provide access for maintenance and cleaning.

Service line will be extended from the sanitary sewer main to the right-of-way line to provide service to the adjacent properties as they develop. The service lines will also be PVC pipe with gasketed joints, and will be 6 to 8 inches in diameter, depending on the capacity required.

The proposed sanitary sewer construction is shown on Figure No. 2 in Appendix A.

### Watermain

The extension of a 16-inch diameter watermain along the entire length of the Carlson Drive Street extension is proposed. The watermain will provide water service to the adjacent properties. The proposed 16-inch diameter watermain is larger than the typical 8-inch watermain because it is intended to ultimately be looped with the existing perimeter trunk watermain looping system to provide and enhance water service, water pressure, fire protection and redundancy for the northwesterly portion of the City, including the North Port Industrial Park.

Hydrants will be installed at appropriate intervals and valves will be provided to properly isolate the system for flushing, repair, and maintenance. Along with new sanitary sewer service to each lot, new 6- to 8-inch diameter water services will be extended to the right-of-

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way line and shut off valve added.

The proposed watermain construction is shown on Figure No. 2 in Appendix A.

### **Other Utilities**

The design of the proposed improvements will be coordinated with the owners of private utilities such as natural gas, electric, telephone, and cable television. Plans will be provided to all private utility companies during design to communicate the proposed improvements and construction schedule. This will allow utility companies enough time to plan and design their utility extensions. The construction schedule for the proposed improvements will be coordinated with the utility company work to avoid unnecessary delays.

### **APPROVALS AND PERMITS**

Approvals and Permits are required from various agencies for the construction of the project. They include:

- Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) General Construction Storm Water Permit
- MPCA Sanitary Sewer Extension Permit
- Minnesota Department of Health (MDH) Plan Review (watermain extension)

### PROJECT COST ESTIMATE AND FINANCING

The estimated project costs are summarized below.

A detailed cost estimate and breakdown is provided in Exhibit No. 1 in Appendix B.

These cost estimates are based on public construction cost information from other recent projects similar in scope. Since the cost estimates are dependent on the cost of labor, materials, competitive bidding process, weather conditions, and other factors affecting the cost of construction, all cost estimates are opinions for general information and no warranty or guarantee as to the accuracy of construction cost is

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made. Therefore, financing for this project should be based upon actual competitive bid prices with reasonable contingencies.

Northland Securities, Inc., is assisting the City with the financing of the project. According to information provided by the financial advisor. It is anticipated that the project will be financed using a general obligation bond and the bond payments will come from the following revenue sources:

- Special assessments on property to be annexed into the City.
- Property tax levy to pay for the portion of the project that will have deferred assessments, and not collectible at this time. The deferred assessments are for the properties on the north side of Carlson Drive to remain outside the City limits; deferred assessments will be collected at such time that the property is annexed into the City. Depending on the timing of the collection of the deferred assessments, the City will have the option of cancelling all or a portion of the annual property tax levy for debt service.
- Enterprise funds (utility oversizing costs).

The City is also pursuing a Greater Minnesota Public Infrastructure Grant through the Minnesota Department of Economic Development. If successful, this grant would fund up to 50% of the project costs, although a grant amount of 35% is probably more likely.

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In the past, the City of North Mankato has utilized a staged construction process for new street and underground utility projects where by the improvements are constructed over several years.

- Year 1: Underground utilities, street excavation and aggregate base materials.
- Year 2: Curb & gutter, sidewalk, trail, driveways, final turf establishments, and bituminous surfacing (except for the final layer).
- Year 3 5: Final layer of bituminous surfacing.

This staged construction process has served the City well in that it provides time for street excavations and utility trenches to stabilize before the street and surface improvements are constructed. In the past, the separate stages have been constructed under separate contracts. For this project, if the staged construction process is utilized, it is anticipated that all of the improvements would be constructed under one contract, but the contractor would be required to delay portions of the construction until future years. This could impact bid prices, since the bidders would need to speculate on what material, labor and fuel costs may be in future years. The staged construction process would also need to be coordinated with the construction schedule for the proposed development south of Commerce Drive. The possibility of utilizing a staged construction process will continue to be evaluated and a recommendation will be made at the time plans and specifications are reviewed with the City Council.

### CONCLUSION AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The extension of City roads and utilities is necessary for the expansion of North Mankato's industrial park. From an engineering standpoint, this project is feasible, cost effective, necessary, and can best be accomplished by letting competitive bids for the work. Feasibility is contingent upon City Council findings with respect to project financing.

We recommend that the Council accept this report, call for a hearing on the proposed improvements.

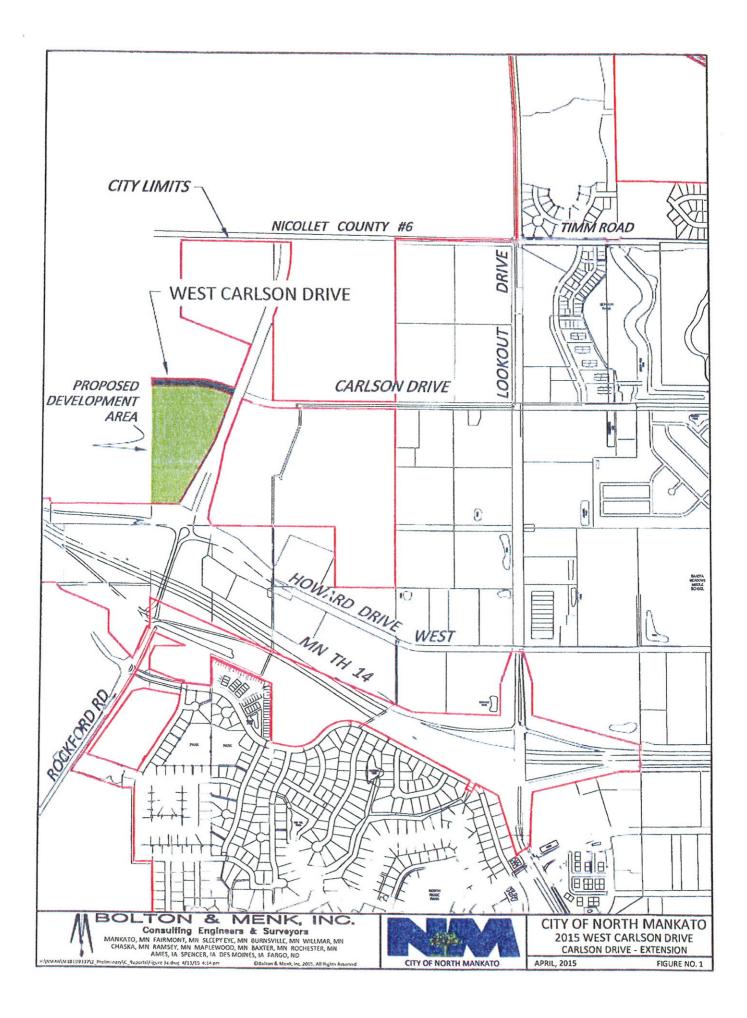


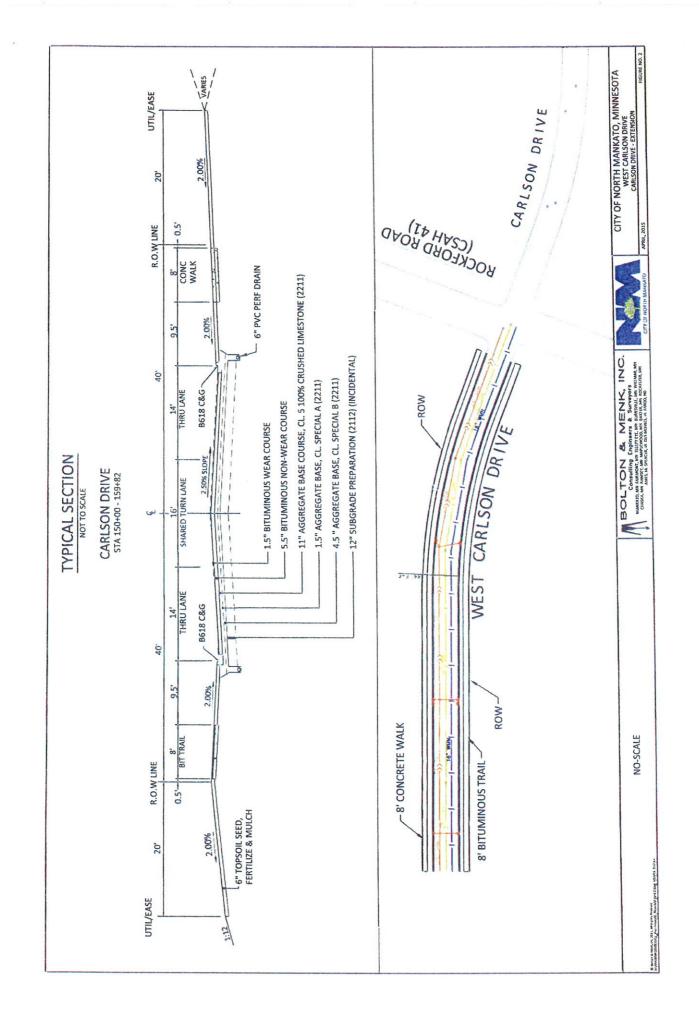

### **₽**§ 156.038 R1-S, ONE-FAMILY DWELLING, SMALL LOT DISTRICT.

(A) *Purpose*. This district is intended to establish an area of single-family residential development on smaller lots.

(B) Permitted uses. The following are permitted uses:

- (1) Single family detached dwellings.
- (2) Fences.
- (3) Non-commercial gardening.
- (4) Landscaping.
- (5) Driveways.

(6) Churches, provided that no building shall be located within 50 feet of any abutting lot line in any of the classes of residential districts.

(7) Public buildings and uses of the following kind: elementary and secondary schools, parks, playgrounds, libraries, museums, community centers and recreation centers, or private schools having a curriculum equivalent to a public elementary school or public high school.

(8) Home occupations. See § 156.035(BB).

(C) Conditional uses. The following uses may be permitted:

(1) Cemetery.

(2) Government, public utility and public service uses.

(D) Accessory uses. The following are permitted uses:

(1) Private garage.

(2) Inground private swimming pool or similar recreational facilities when completed enclosed with a suitable fence at least 6 feet in height.

- (3) Aboveground swimming pool.
- (4) Driveways.

(5) Off-street parking.

- (6) Utility buildings.
- (7) Solar energy systems.
- (8) Satellite reception equipment.

(E) Lot area (detached). Every single family detached dwelling erected shall require a lot area of not less than 76,50 square feet.

(F) Lot width and depth.

(1) Lot width (detached). Every lot or plot upon which there is erected a single family detached dwelling shall require a minimum width of  $\frac{70}{65}$  feet at the building setback line.

(2) Lot depth. Every lot or plot upon which there is erected a single family dwelling shall require a minimum depth of not less than 100 feet.

(G) Yard regulations.

(1) Front yard. For all uses allowed there shall be a front yard of not less than 30 feet. Where a lot is located at the intersection of 2 or more streets there shall be a <u>30</u> front yard <u>setback on the side having the driveway and a 15 front yard setback</u> on <u>each the other</u> street side. Only one (1) driveway shall be permitted per dwelling.

(2) Side yard. For all uses allowed there shall be a side yard of not less than  $\frac{108}{108}$  feet.

(3) Rear yard. For all uses allowed there shall be a rear yard of not less than 25 feet.

(4) Transitional yards. There are no requirements.

(H) *Ground coverage*. Not more than 40% of a lot or plot shall be covered by all main and accessory buildings.

(I) *Height regulations*. No structure hereafter erected or altered shall exceed 2-1/2 stories or 30 feet in height. Accessory uses shall not exceed 1-1/2 stories or 22 feet in height.

(J) *Variances*. No variances to reduce minimum building setbacks or minimum lot sizes shall be granted in the R-1 S, One-Family Dwelling-Small Lot District.

(Ord. passed - - ; Am. Ord. 8, 4th series, passed 1-16-2007)

CITY OF NORTH MANKATO PARK PERMIT This permit does reserve space in a City Park.

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### **ORDINANCE NO. 68, FOURTH SERIES**

### AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF NORTH MANKATO, MINNESOTA, AMENDING NORTH MANKATO CITY CODE, TITLE XI, BUSINESS REGULATIONS, CHAPTER 111, ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NORTH MANKATO, MINNESOTA, ORDAINS:

Section 1. Sections of North Mankato City Code, Title XI, Business Regulations, Chapter 111, Alcoholic Beverages are hereby amended as follows:

### § 111.205 HOURS OF SALE

(B) *Intoxicating liquor, on-sale.* No sale of intoxicating liquor at on-sale may be made at the following times:

(1) Between 2:00 a.m. and 8:00 a.m. on the days of Monday throughSunday;

(2) Between 8:00 p.m. on December 24 and 8:00 a.m. on December 25.

(C) *Sunday liquor sales*. A licensee possessing an on-sale intoxicating liquor license as well as a Sunday liquor license shall make no sales of alcoholic beverages at the following times:

(1) Between 2:00 a.m. and 8:00 a.m. on the days of Monday through Sunday;

(2) Between 8:00 p.m. on December 24 and 2:00 a.m. on December 25;

(3) Between 2:00 a.m. and 8:00 a.m. on December 25.

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Definitions and Assumptions

### **Executive Summary**

- The direct economic impact of Caswell Park is estimated to be \$3.5 million annually based on assumptions for spending on hotels, restaurants, groceries, fuel and shopping among athletes and their guests traveling to North Mankato for tournaments
- Caswell Park hosts on average 19 tournaments each year for softball, baseball and soccer bringing in an average of 490 teams and 31,561 visitors.

### **Definitions and Assumptions**

Visitors are the total players + the total spectators.

Local Visitors are those traveling within 75 miles.

The following costs are assumed for Local visitors:

- Shopping = \$6 per day
- Meals = \$10 per day
- Grocery = \$5 per day

Out of Town Visitors are those traveling more than 75 miles.

The following costs are assumed for Out of Town visitors:

- Hotel = \$36 per night per day for softball / \$57 per night per day for soccer and baseball
- Fuel= \$15 per tournament/ \$26 per tournament for soccer and baseball
- Shopping = \$12 per day
- Meals = \$20 per day
- Grocery = \$5 per day

### Average spending at a 1 day softball tournament:

- \$21 for Local Visitor
- \$52 for Out of Town Visitor

### Average Spending at a 2 day softball tournament:

- \$42 for Local Visitor
- \$93 for Out of Town Visitor

### Average spending at a 1 day baseball or soccer tournament:

- \$21 for Local Visitor
- \$63 for Out of Town Visitor

### Average spending at a 2 day baseball or soccer tournament:

- \$42 for Local Visitor
- \$157 for Out of Town Visitor

### Introduction

### Purpose

Constructed in 1985, the Caswell Sports Complex is a nationally recognized sporting facility for softball competitions. As a regional recreational asset, the Caswell Complex, by hosting local, state, and national tournaments, first serves the local needs of sporting groups and second serves as a generator of commercial activity for the hospitality, food, and retail sectors. In 2013, construction of an addition to the Caswell Sports Complex was completed to serve the needs of youth soccer in the region. This addition also serves as a generator of commercial activity. The purpose of this study is to quantify the regional economic impact of the Caswell Sports Complex.

### Economic Impact Defined

Economic impact is the net change in the host community's economy as a result of spending attributed to a specific service or event and typically relates only to new money injected into an economy by visitors from outside the community. Only those visitors who reside outside the jurisdiction and whose primary motivation for visiting is to attend the event, or who stay longer and spend more time in the community because of the event, are typically included in an economic impact study. <sup>1</sup> However, if there is evidence to suggest that a sports tournament keeps some residents at home who would otherwise leave the area for a trip, then these local expenditures are legitimately considered as an economic impact because money has been retained in the host community that would otherwise have been spent outside it. <sup>2</sup>

Because several local teams participate in tournaments held at Caswell Park, this study includes the impact of spending from both visiting teams and local teams and assigns an economic impact to both visitors and local spectators.

### **Facility Descriptions and Tournaments**

### Caswell Park Softball Complex

The complex features six lighted and fully equipped softball fields, permanent concessions, restrooms, and a playground as well as parking. Each of the six softball fields is complete with shaded concrete dugouts, bat racks, and drinking fountains. Caswell Park has electronic scoreboards and upper deck viewing for all six fields.

### Miracle League Field

Fallenstein Field is a special needs accessible softball/baseball field which complies with all National Wheelchair Softball Association (NWSA) specifications. Fallenstein Field provides opportunities for children and adults with disabilities to actively participate in the sport of softball/baseball.

The Miracle League of North Mankato broke ground on the building of Fallenstein Field at Caswell Park on July 10, 2007. The field features a rubberized surface conducive to wheelchair use as well as a scoreboard, lights, spacious dugouts and enough bats, balls and helmets to outfit all players. For guests, the field features a shaded picnic area, chairs, tables, bleachers and electrical outlets.

### Tournaments (Miracle League)

Most of the Miracle Leagues' 103 athletes live in the area and play four nights a week during the nine week summer season. The league also has a five-week fall season with 40 athletes. A relatively new aspect of this years' League is the introduction of traveling teams coming to play at the Miracle League Field. This years' schedule hosts one team traveling from Lakeville on August 8 and the Miracle League is desires to expand this tournament in the future. Participation in the Miracle League grew nearly 40% in the past two years.

### **Caswell North Soccer**

Established in 2013, Caswell North Soccer Complex consists of 25 acres divided into ten, high quality soccer fields, concessions and bathrooms. The championship field is equipped with lighting. The building of this complex was in response to the growing popularity of soccer in the area and the demand for quality facilities. Caswell North Soccer Complex is the primary playing site for the Mankato United Soccer Club (MUSC).

### Tournaments (Soccer)

In its first year of operation, Caswell North Soccer Complex hosted the US Youth Soccer Minnesota State Cup and the Minnesota Youth Soccer Association Summer State Championship.

### Methodology

### Annual Visitors

The methodology used to assess the economic impact of Caswell Park Sports Complex utilizes data obtained from local, regional, and national sports groups sponsoring baseball, softball and soccer tournaments. Records from the 2013, 2014 and 2015 season schedules provide accurate projections for the number of annual tournaments, number of teams attending the tournaments, number of participants on each team and the likely amount of time spent in the region while participating in these events. Please note hotel spending was not included for out of town teams when tournaments were only one day in length. In addition, actual attendance has been used when available to calculate the number of visitors.

Using the information described above except for when actual attendance is available, the average number of spectators per player was calculated as indicated below:

- Studies completed by the National Association of Sports Commissions indicate 3.1 spectators per athlete for youth Girls Softball tournaments.
- This calculation is adjusted for the Minnesota State High School events because actual ticket revenue from the events indicates a greater spectator attendance than 3.1 per player and can be verified with actual attendance numbers.
- For baseball tournaments, men's softball tournaments, and soccer tournaments the average spectators per athlete is calculated at 1.9 based on information collected by the National Association of Sports Commissions.

Multiplying the statistics supplied by the National Association of Sports Commissions with the number of teams and average players derived from tournament schedules provides the total number of visitors to North Mankato for baseball, soccer, and softball tournaments (except when actual attendance is available).

### **Geographic Location**

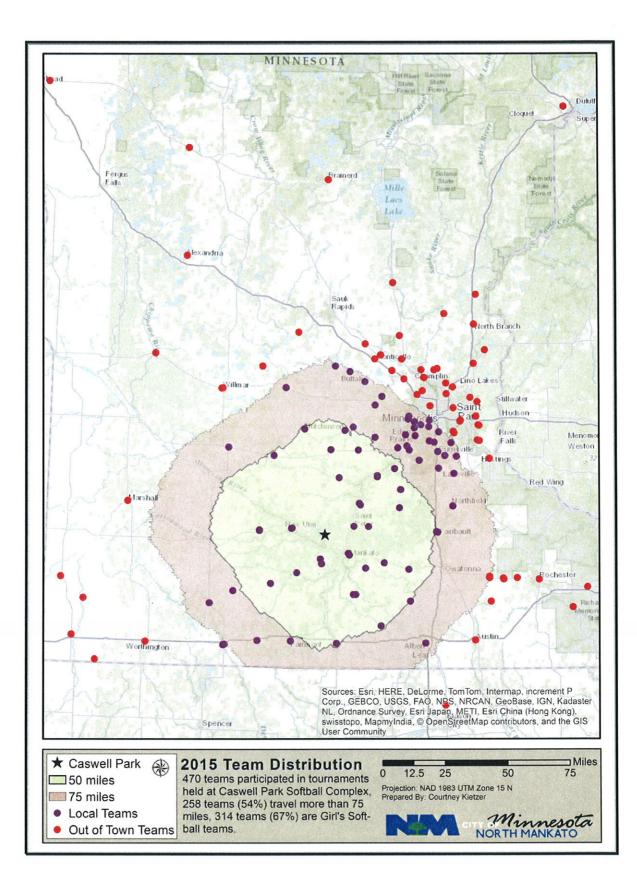
The number of visitors traveling to tournaments based on the total number of players is not enough to determine the direct economic impact generated by the Caswell Complex. Although the majority of teams travel from within the state of Minnesota, some teams travel from as far away as Rapid City,

South Dakota and Winnipeg in the Province of Manitoba, Canada to participate in these tournaments. To determine the amount of visitor spending this study has categorized visitors based on their geographic location; *Local visitors*, those traveling within a 75 mile radius of the facility, and *out of town visitors*, those traveling a distance of more than 75 miles for a tournament. Assuming tournament participants traveling within 75 miles of Caswell will not spend the night, local teams are excluded from hotel/motel and fuel spending estimates.

### Analysis

### **Total Annual Visitors**

Table 1 shows the total number of visitors to North Mankato for 2014 baseball, softball, and soccer tournaments. Each tournament is associated with the number of teams, number of players per team, and the average spectators per player. The final column contains the calculated estimates for the number of visitors (player + spectator) per tournament. The sum of this column is the total number of visitors to Caswell each year. The results of the analysis project a total of 26,423 individual visitors annually to North Mankato for tournament play at Caswell Park

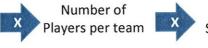

### 3 Year Total and Average Annual Regional Economic Impact Estimate

Analysis results indicate that Caswell Park has generated \$10,639,024.70 in the last three years of operation, averaging \$3,546,341.57 in visitor spending each season.
